Principal's Message

Mudgee High School students continue to excel in the wide range of extra curricular activities offered by the staff at our school. In recent days:

- A group of talented computing students from Year 8 were placed 3rd in the state for their entry to a computing animation competition.

Last Friday night marked the last official school function for our Year 12 class of 2011. Over 500 students, staff, parents and friends gathered at Parklands for the Year 12 Farewell. As always this was a wonderful night of celebration, touched with a little sadness as Year 12 realised that this would be their final time together as a whole group.

Many positions on the staff at schools these days are filled by a merit selection process involving an application, CV and interview. Parent and community members are an important part of these selection panels. A short session of training is required before a volunteer can participate in a staff selection panel. Interested parents are invited to undergo that training process in the School Library tonight from 6:00pm to 7:15pm.

Behind the scenes a great deal of work is being done on: timetables, staffing, purchase of resources, budgeting and other preparations for 2012. CAREERS NEWS

Choosing a Career – Times have changed. A career is now seen as the sum of the learning and work roles people choose to undertake in order to construct the lives they want to live – lives which take into account important priorities such as family, social and community responsibilities.

The notion of having one job for life is a thing of the past for most people. With jobs changing constantly, people now need to keep learning throughout their lives and take charge of their own futures.

Careers News Cont. - Importantly, most of the career choices that will be available to young people will require them to have completed some post-secondary education or training. With this in mind, they will be better placed to move smoothly through school and on to further education or training if they start exploring their options sooner rather than later.

Your Career Pathway – Your career pathway is the unique route you choose, from the many routes available, to reach your career goals. Your career pathway will involve you completing formal and informal learning, developing your skills and experiencing education and training, community and personal life.

Education and training pathways – In Australia, the qualifications you gain at schools, vocational education and training providers and universities can be linked up in different ways, so that you can reach your career goal by many different pathways. Recognition of prior learning (RPL) allows you to get credit for your existing knowledge and skills, such as your:

- life experience (e.g. voluntary work, hobbies, sport)
- work experience (including unpaid work)
- previous study (e.g. courses at school or college, adult education classes, training and professional development programs at work).

Following your career pathway means making some choices. Ask yourself these questions:

- What have I learnt from my life experiences that I want to use in my career?
- What career fields am I interested in?
- What pathways could I take to get to those career fields?
- Do I need to take a course at a tertiary institution (a private college, TAFE or university)?
- What are the entry requirements for those institutions?
- When I finish the course, what jobs will I qualify for?
- Who do I know who can help me?
- What resources and networks does my community have to offer?
- How can I use my personal networks of family, friends and associates to build my career?

Base your career and educational choices on who you are today. You can always change the course of your pathway in the future, as you yourself, and your desires, change.

Personal pathways – To play a personal pathway, you need to know:

- what you like
- what's important to you
- · what you're good at
- who the people in your personal network are.

You need to consider your past decisions and experiences, your existing skills, your ambitions for the future and any information or advice you've discovered about your desired career.

Give them Five – A team of experienced career development practitioners has come up with five key messages that will help you to support your child's career learning. Known as the "High Five" of Career Development, these messages will help if your child doesn't yet have an answer to the question: What are you going to be when you grow up?

One: Change is Constant – Taking a flexible approach when planning a new career can greatly assist when unexpected changes happen. Making plans is great – adjusting them along the way can also assist in creating new opportunities.

Two: Follow your Heart – Encourage your child to dream of a future full of different types of career choices enables them to explore and expand their career possiblities. What may appear to be an unconventional or unrealistic choice may just be the very thing that materialises into a career for your child.

Three: Focus on the Journey – Enjoying the journey to your child's career destination is vital. Whilst outcomes are important, remembering to explore and experiment with different career paths can be productive and lots of fun for both of you.

Four: Keep Learning – Keeping up to date and adapting to change is important in today's environment. Learning comes from many experiences not only workplace training but also from everyday activities such as using social network sites on your PC, being part of a community group, sporting teams and family members.

Five: Be an Ally – While wanting young people to be self directed we also want them to feel part of a community that cares for them. Being a career "ally" is part of being a support network for those who are exploring career paths. These support networks can consist of parents, neighbours, family, friends and employers and can be a terrific support for your child when maing career choices.
