AGRICULTURE REPORT

With the passing of this year's Mudgee Show, we can take stock of our performances in many areas.

Year 11 Primary Industries did an outstanding job with final preparations of both sheep and cattle on the Thursday prior to the show. This all day activity was crucial for one elective module and highlighted the intense preparation undertaken by exhibitors to impress the judge.

Friday was the junior judging, coaching and zone final day. Our juniors were keen to learn and well behaved. The U/15 group were trained in the finer points of judging sheep, cattle, wool and grain with the long term goal of bringing them into the competitive age group with the skills and interest needed to perform at the Royal or make informed appraisal on farms.

Competition was strong this year with more entries and an increased number of schools present. The top two entrants in the senior (zone final) category qualify for competition at the Royal Easter Show state finals. Our top performers were:

Saturday brought the competition for sheep and cattle. Once again, Mudgee High was entered into the White Suffolk stud sheep section. While we were not able to emulate the high achievement of 2010, there was good feedback from the judge and other breeders for improving small conformational faults while stressing the strong points in our genetics.

The show steers were also on display and received high praise from the judge and spectators. With Mudgee High providing the only entries in this class, the placings were assured but the day was about preparation of the handlers and cattle for the Royal. Unfortunately an accident in transit to school following the show injured two steers and participation in Sydney is unlikely at present.

Also on Saturday were competitions for animal handling. Kelsey Johnson was first in the sheep section while in cattle, Lucy Cheetham took out first place in juniors and, in seniors, Mitchell O'Gorman was first and Courtney Denniss second.

Another group of students to be congratulated are the many who volunteered several hours on the Saturday to run children's activities. They did this for very little reward but their efforts made these activities possible and for which many people are sincerely grateful.

The Saturday just past was our annual autumn plant and poultry sale. This was another huge success thanks largely to the support of the community. The money raised will help sustain the diverse range of experiences provided in our Agriculture programmes.

Bob Withey, an expert in reptiles from Australian Reptile Displays will be visiting the school with his collection of snakes, lizards and turtles. His presentation will cover how reptiles fit into the environment and how we can avoid being injured by them. UNIFORM

We stay in Calgary every second weekend and have a look at the local sites. It is a beautiful city with much to do. Canadians are the biggest coffee drinkers in the world. Even the shopping trolleys have special holders for your coffee cups. What I do not like about the Calgary system? Their holidays are all over the place. I like our neat 10 weeks of school then two weeks off. Much easier to work out. For the record my next holiday is March 26th for a week and we are off to Jasper to ski.

I could write much more but there is not time. Every day is an adventure and everyday tasks are an adventure. For example the day after we picked up our new car we went to the local supermarket, came out and it was -28 and the car would not start. Battery gone. Have you ever tried to put jumper leads on in gloves?.... difficult. Even more difficult when you take the gloves off to put the leads on and your fingers drop off. Earned a Tim Horton's coffee after that one!!! *Richard Finter*
