## **KOKODA YOUTH CHALLENGE**

At the end of September, I left for Papua New Guinea with 24 strangers, about to embark upon the hardest challenge of my life; walking the Kokoda Trail. I was sponsored by Club Mudgee to be a part of the Kokoda Youth Leadership Challenge for 2012. It was the first time Club Mudgee had sponsored someone for the program which aims to stretch the physical and mental boundaries of the participants while developing their leadership skills and understanding of Australia's military history. The trip didn't get off to the best of starts. Before even taking off, an airhostess attempted to shove a laptop into one of the overhead compartments however failed and dropped it straight onto my head; the pain was a sign of things to come.

The trek was a 10 day hike through the Owen Stanley Ranges, starting from the village of Kokoda and finishing around 130km later at Ower's Corner. During that time I walked along the same track as the Australian soldiers did 70 years ago. The heat was unforgiving at times; some of the inclines seemed to be almost vertical; and with all the slippery mud it was a case of one step forward, two steps back. How the soldiers managed to fight their way through it back in World War 2, I'll never know. But walking the track does give a little understanding as to what they went through and the human qualities that they showed throughout the Campaign. There's a place where we stayed at on Day 2 called Isurava. It was there where the members of 39<sup>th</sup> and 2/14<sup>th</sup> Battalion managed to dramatically slow down the Japanese advance and allow Australian reinforcements enough time to make their way up the track to where the conflict was raging.

Had they not been successful, the outcome of the Campaign and the landscape of Australia would be very different to what it is today. Four black granite pillars with the words – courage, endurance, mateship and sacrifice – engraved in them stand at the battle site as an enduring memorial to the diggers who fought along the track. It was these qualities which helped them make it through the unforgiving and indescribable terrain of the Kokoda Trail during wartime.

Along the track I got to see and do some pretty amazing things. I saw mountains that stretched up into the clouds, wartime ammunition dumps, villages hidden deep within the jungle and even machete-wielding babies. I got to swim across fast-flowing creeks, walk along the track in the darkness of the morning, meet a Fuzzy Wuzzy Angel and walk in the footsteps of the diggers. Though it was by far the toughest thing I have ever done, it was also the most rewarding. Walking the Kokoda Trail with people who, in the beginning, were strangers to me was difficult. For the first couple of days it felt like I was on my own, in extreme condition with only one way to go in order to get home. However as the days went by I learnt to open up and trust the people around me as I realised I wasn't alone in this and had plenty of support around me in the trek leader, the carriers and my fellow trekkers. Over the 10 days of trekking, I learnt to believe in myself and have faith in my ability to lead and work with other people to achieve something that only around 1% of Australians have had the opportunity to achieve. Having done that, I feel more confident within myself and have a greater appreciation for what I've got in my life. Something that I don't think would have happened without the Kokoda Youth Leadership Challenge. I encourage you all to apply for this program when the opportunity is presented to you because it is truly an amazing life-changing experience which very few people get the chance to have. *Brayden Palmer*

#### **BURAAYDYALANG STUDENT GROUP**

## **Community Notices**

## **TAXI VOUCHER**

Are you a school student aged 12 to 17 years old? A full-time TAFE student up to 24 years? Or a part-time TAFE student up to 24 years and holder of a health card? If you have answered yes to any of these questions you may be eligible for a Mudgee Community Transport Youth Taxi Voucher.

A Taxi Voucher entitles you to a \$3 subsidy per trip up to 10 times per month (conditions apply). Drop into the Carmel Croan Community Centre on the corner of Market and Douro Streets with your School/TAFE identification card (and health care card, if applicable) to complete an application form.

## **NSW RURAL FIRE SERVICE - Permits to Light a Fire**

**The Bush Fire Danger Period** – runs from 1<sup>st</sup> Oct to 31<sup>st</sup> March. If you are planning to light a fire in the open during this time, you will need a permit.

**To Obtain a Permit?** Contact the NSW Rural Fire Service, Cudgegong District on 6372 4434 who will provide details of who to contact.

What Else Do I Need to Do? Before lighting the fire ensure that:

- you notify your neighbours at least 24 hours before burning;
- you notify Cudgegong Rural Fire District at least 24 hours before burning;
- it can be contained and controlled within the specified area;
- it does not contain toxic materials, such as rubber tyres, plastics, paint etc;
- it must not cause an air pollutiong problem by producing excessive amounts of smoke.
- you must also check whether a Total Fire Ban is in force as permits are cancelled if the fire danger level is Very High or above.

It is extremely important that you ensure that there is a good fire break around the burn area to avoid fire escaping.

From 1<sup>st</sup> April to 30<sup>th</sup> September (outside the times when a paper permit is required) you must notify Cudgegong Rural Fire District 24hours before you wish to burn, also notify your neighbours of your intention to burn.
