Press Release: Two Local Principals Honoured

Today Gregory Prior Deputy Director-General, Schools Department of Education and Communities announced the recipients of the *2012–2013 Leadership Fellowships*. Two of our local principals Mrs Louise Manwaring principal of Mudgee High School and Mr Alan Kerr principal of Kandos Public School were selected as State recipients.

These prestigious fellowships provide a unique opportunity for principals to undertake research in key areas of leadership in Australia or overseas and to make a significant contribution to their continuous, life-long learning.

The principals will research leading professional learning communities and teams and virtual faculties as a leadership model in Western NSW. Findings from the fellowships will be published on the Department's website.

This opportunity will enhance the knowledge of best practice is professional learning for schools and communities of teachers. The research fellowships include a \$10,000 grant to fund the research and time to travel within Australia and overseas to conduct the research.

Only four State Fellowships are granted each year and to have two granted in our own community to our public school principals reflects the outstanding quality of the education provided within the Mid-Western area.

Recently published research shows that where teachers learn from each other and engage in learning communities the quality of their teaching is enhanced and students outcomes are improved. In our schools where achievement for all students is high this opportunity will ensure our public schools are lighting the way for 12st century learning for years to come.

MARINE STUDIES

Marine studies students have already had a busy time this year, with Eva Pibrovec and Jayme Muscat visiting the Philippines with Mr Willetts and other past students. In November, the class will be travelling to Nelson Bay for five days of studying the marine environment and to complete Open Water (learn to dive) and advanced diving courses.

We will be investigating the temperate marine environment and it's confluence with the tropical currents of the East Australian Current. Halifax Marine Park in Nelson Bay is rated in the top 10 shore dive sites in Australia!

Students will have the opportunity to experience the astonishing volume and variety of marine life that rivals anywhere in Australia. In fact 85% of the marine life in temperate Australia is unique and is found nowhere else on earth! We will investigate how to identify and categorise these marine life species.

Marine Studies Students Visit the Philippines





In July, past and current marine studies students, family and friends embarked on an 18 day adventure to the Philippines, travelling first to Puerto Galera in Oriental Mindoro province and then flying to Malapascua Island on the tip of Cebu province. Escaping the winter chills of Mudgee, we enjoyed daily temperatures above 30°C, balmy nights and diving in water between 29-32°C with visibility up to 40m!

The Philippines is the apex of the Coral Triangle which stretches to Malaysia in the west and Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands in the east. It is the most biologically diverse area of the world and is far superior and diverse than our Great Barrier Reef. It contains three quarters of the world's known coral species, a third of the world's coral reefs, more than 3,000 species of fish and the world's richest mangrove forests. The trip provided an excellent complement to the Coral Reef Ecology unit of work.

Both destinations are famed for their rare and unique macro life, such as the frog fish (angler fish) opposite, the spiny leaf fish (there are two in the picture) and the 5-8mm Denise's pygmy seahorse discovered about 3 years


ago.







In the past decade or so, Malapascua Island has become world famous as the only place where you can be guaranteed to see the thresher shark (9 in every 10 dives) on Monad Shoal. A beautiful, sleek and extremely shy shark, characterised by the long scythe shaped tail which contributes to half of their 6m length! They can only be seen at dawn when they come up from the dark depths of over 200m to the top of the shoal in 20 - 30m of water to be cleaned. Despite the 4:30am wake-up, the spectacular sunrises and the diving experience which included manta rays, was well worth the daily effort.

FOOD TECHNOLOGY

Year 10 students in FT06 are currently studying the development of new food products. Utilising design skills and the steps used by manufacturers to develop a new product, students will be developing their own new food product.

The class have been given a realistic Design Situation and Brief for a well-known food manufacturer seeking to further their product range and to improve profitability.

Each student is to conduct their own market research, develop ideas and finally produce a product prototype to be tested on the target market. This evaluation by the target market will enable students to then modify the prototype to produce an improved version.

Students will be drawing upon their skills in food preparation, knowledge of the target market and product category and importantly, an understanding of food properties and how different food components behave in certain conditions. These skills and knowledge drawn from previous experiences will be crucial to the success of the prototype.

As teachers, we really enjoy this assessment too, because it provides an opportunity to see students apply years of experience into a creative and realistic food technology situation. Each year, students create a range of products that are very unique and could be guite successful if mass produced. We eagerly await the results of this years' creative minds!


The Inner Quad Café

TX02 Felting Excursion to 'Spun Out'

On 21st August Mrs Bailey's TX02 class went to the 'spun out' workshop. When we arrived we were welcomed by Pat and her two dogs Suzie and Gemma. We were given our wool and started by dyeing our angora wool after we had cleaned it with soapy water. We measured food colouring into a plastic cup and then filled the cup with vinegar water. Once dyed we wrapped it in cling wrap, put it in the microwave for one minute, the laid it in the sun to dry.


After we had recess we cleaned and dyed silk using landscape dyes. We put dye powder in a plastic cup and filled it with warm water and vinegar. After we dyed it we wrapped it in cling wrap and microwaved it then after lunch it was time to do some felting and be creative. They got to make a 3D flower with a stem on it with any colour wool they wanted. The girls finished the flowers and after they packed up it was time to leave. It was a great day for everyone and it was enjoyable.











The Year 11 Textiles and Design class has over the past term been working on their projects that require them to modify a commercial pattern for either pants or a skirt and make their new design. The students also had to document the processes they used to design and make their project. This resulted in 20 very unique projects that reflected the dedication and passion of the students. The overall quality of the products and folios was excellent.

Bridge to the Future Student Scholarship

Students in years 10-12 are invited to apply for a scholarship to support their transition from school to future education or work. Applicants must be students of Mudgee High School who will complete Year 10 as a minimum at the end of the year the scholarship is granted. A written application must be submitted to the principal by September 3. Applicants will then be short listed for interview. The successful applicant will receive a scholarship of \$1000 which may be used to support them in pursuing their future goals in education or employment.

- > The criteria for the application must each be addressed in the written application and will then be further explored at interview.
- > Applications should be a maximum of two typed A4 pages and respond to each of the criteria in no more than half a page each.
- A copy of the applicant's most recent school report should be included.
- Additional documents in support of the application may also be included. Some examples are: referees letters, copies of certificates from school or community achievements, copies of qualifications which demonstrate commitment to self-improvement or your goals.

A criterion for the scholarship is disadvantage or hardship which may prevent you achieving your goals for your future.

Criteria:

- 1. Outline the personal goals and the career or academic aspirations you have for the next two years.
- 2. In what ways have you suffered either disadvantage or hardship which may impact on you achieving your goals?
- 3. What steps have you taken to assist yourself to achieve your personal goals up to this time?
- 4. How would the scholarship support your future goals?
- 5. Anything else you wish to add in support of your application.
