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Principal's Message Persistence

Although not a big fan of quoting others, much less American presidents, I enjoyed the following quote provided by a colleague this week. It comes from Calvin Coolidge, who served as US president from 1923 until 1929:

Nothing in the world will take the place of persistence. Talent will not. Nothing is more common than unsuccessful people with talent. Genius will not. Unrewarded genius is almost a proverb. Education will not. The world is full of educated derelicts. Persistence and determination alone are omnipotent.

Persistence is an excellent character trait. The determination to do better, combined with the resilience to look beyond the inevitable setbacks that will almost assuredly befall those who possess the tenacity to see a thing through, are the characteristics of the truly worthy.

As an educator, little feels better than to see persistence rewarded; to see a student who has struggled with a concept finally "get it" – the epiphany moment – and have that persistence rewarded.

Talent unused or genius not realised are challenges for educators. They are things to be cultivated; things to be nurtured. But like the proverbial horse led to water, those gifts rely on the owner realising and acting upon his or her obligations. The skills and knowledge can be developed at school but only with the co-operation, determination and persistence of those with talent or those possessing potential genius.

As teachers, we too persist even when the situation seems somewhat arid. We do this because sometimes our persistence is rewarded. We lead that horse time and again to the watering hole and sometimes that horse drinks!

Finally, as parents we persist. What adolescent would achieve their 'P's if not for the persistence of parents? As a parent of three quite dissimilar boys, I take a great deal of pleasure from the successes met by my children but especially my middle child. The talents he possesses have not all been suited to school, but as the last of his HSC exams roll around in these next weeks, I am heartened by the approach he has taken to his studies. He possesses persistence and determination by the bucket load and has applied himself to the best of his ability.

What more can we ask of our children?
