# **ENGLISH FACULTY NEWS**

# Topics being covered in English

English is a subject which covers a variety of topics. This term students will be looking at a variety of texts and text types.

- Year 7 will be looking at animation and drama
- Year 8 will be discovering the transition of narratives from the page to screen
- Year 9 shall be delving into the areas of survival, comedy and prejudice
- Year 10 will be finishing up Macbeth, the representation of Australia in film and classic fiction.
- Year 11 Advanced will be concluding their Area of Study with Skrzynecki's poetry and moving onto the History and Memory module.
- Year 11 Standard English will be tying up their study on Module B and moving onto the realm of Belonging with the Area of Study.

# **Essay Writing Clinic**

Year 11 have the opportunity to enhance their essay writing skills at a clinic with Mrs Davies each Wednesday. The great thing about this is that the content can be applied to any subject that requires an extended response. This week Mrs Davies will be discussing how to write a captivating introduction and conclusion, as well as how to create the essential thesis statement.

Other topics to be covered in the upcoming weeks include: using evidence, including quotes to support ideas and incorporating segues and conjunctions to make the transition from one idea to another smooth and constructive. If Year 11 students have any queries regarding essay style or structure, it is strongly suggested that they take the time to attend one (or more) of these sessions so that they will be able to perfect their writing.

# **Professional Learning**

Throughout this term, a number of English staff has been participating in a number of Professional Learning activities to enhance their knowledge and skills in a variety of areas.

Recently, three teachers went HSC marking, where they graded Standard English papers for a week; and another teacher is away marking Extension English for the next couple of weeks.

With the new National Curriculum being implemented next year in Year 7 and Year 9, new units are being created to encompass the cross-curriculum priorities and texts.

# **Book Amnesty**

As the year comes to an end, the time has arrived for students to go searching for all the texts that they have studied throughout the year and have yet to return to their teacher.

# Hamlet Excursion

Yesterday many intrepid Advanced students and their teachers trekked to Sydney to attend Toby Schmitz's final performance of 'Hamlet', before he leaves the country to take up some film work in America. The performance was sold out with a waiting list of more than 20 people. It was a very modern and confronting perspective of the play. The staging, lighting and musical support were amazing, as were the actors' performances. Schmitz interacted with the audience to keep us on tenterhooks. Robyn Nevins also cleverly portrayed the role of Gertrude to show how she has diminished capacity. The final scene was clever in the use of props, dialogue, and use of chorus to remember the ghost of old king Hamlet. The teachers were disappointed about the exclusion of the character of Horatio, who is Hamlet's foil. Overall, a fantastic production which we were very lucky to see, even if most of us only have had 3 hours sleep before returning to school to attend another day of educational opportunities.
