HOMEWORK TIPS


Decide with your child at the beginning of the year what time homework is to be done and where he or she will be doing it. It is best to have an organised space where they will do their homework. It doesn't have to be in their bedroom, but make sure all the necessary stationery and reference books.

Don't agree to having the TV or music playing while your child is doing his or her homework. It's nothing but distracting and teaches a habit that will be hard to break when the HSC course comes around and there is much memorising to be done.

Boys find it harder than girls to settle down to their homework. To help focus, set some boundaries, a clear work space, and goals, such as a time limit. By placing a clock near their work space and agreeing to a time limit, boys will then know how long they are expected to work.

Tackle big projects with small steps. Together set a schedule for completing the project, taking into account other homework, extra curriculum commitments and fun time. If you break it down into a number of smaller tasks the project won't seem so overwhelming, and you won't be left sitting up till midnight the night before it is due to be finished

SCIENCE NEWS



The start of the new year has brought new and interesting science discoveries and events. Confirmation that an asteroid hitting Earth 66 million years ago did have an impact on the extinction of dinosaurs. In all probability it was the death knell for a group of animals on the verge of extinction from climatic change.

On Feb 15th an asteroid will pass very close to earth. How close? Inside the orbit of our geostationary satellites. In fact so close it will be able to be seen in Australia with binoculars or a telescope, but not with the naked eye. It is about half the size of a football field

Meanwhile on Mars, NASA's Curiosity Rover has been the first machine to drill into a rock on the planet. It is expected the information it obtains will support the present evidence that Mar's had a watery past.



On the school front, Year 10 students have been issued with their Independent Research Project. All students have been emailed a copy of the task as well as being given a paper copy. Parents and caregivers should feel free to discuss an appropriate task that their students could do. Teachers will be happy to provide lots of advice and pointers to help students achieve their best results.

Years 7 to 9 are also about to be issued with their assignments. All students should ensure that they are aware of the due date to ensure they are handed in on time.

For senior students who are by now studying very hard, one of the most important things is for you to do is to always ask for help when you have problems from your teacher. It is no coincidence that top students are often the ones that ask the most questions. By being prepared to ask for help you increase your knowledge and understanding of the course. The Big Science Competition which costs \$7.00 per student is on in May. It is for students of all abilities from Years 7 to 12. There are also great prizes for just taking part. This competition tests critical thinking, problem solving skills and science knowledge and is aligned to the Australian Curriculum. We certainly encourage students to enter these competitions. Make sure you let your teacher know you want to enter.
