Principal's Message

At the end of next week I will be leaving for three weeks to undertake a study tour in Canada. I am exploring ways the schools in Canada help teachers in secondary schools in rural areas to develop their subject teaching skills. I have made a lot of contacts in schools and at universities who will give me some good insights into their system which I can bring back and share with schools here in NSW. While I am out of the country Mr Eade will be relieving principal. I thank him for stepping up to take on the role in my absence.

A letter will come home to parents this week about the processes we use to manage serious issues such as evacuation. Please share this with your students so they can get a greater understanding of how dealing with emergencies and the emergency services work at school. There is also important information for parents on how you can support the school and your students during any event involving the emergency services.
