PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

HSC written examinations began today (Monday 12/10) for the Class of 2015. It was a pleasure to see so many beaming faces at the Baptist Hall, ready to do their best, secure in the knowledge that they have prepared as well as possible and that the HSC examinations are an opportunity for each of them to show what they know and what they can do in a space of 2 to 3 hours.

The HSC also began last week for the Class of 2016. Year 11 is the shortest year for all students as it only lasts for three school terms. Our Class of 2016 became Year 12 HSC students on Tuesday.

The challenge for each member of our new crop of Year 12s is to stay on top of their respective workloads and find an effective balance between study, free time and any part-time work in which they may engage. It's all very adult and very much puts the onus on each of them to get this balance right. The mentoring system that has been in place for many years is about to kick-off again too. This puts individual students in contact with teaching staff who have "been there" and "done that". Students are encouraged to work closely with Mr Hatch so as to make the best use of what is a voluntary and yet very effective practice with a proven track record.

Over the weekend, the following headline appeared in the Sydney press: *Most radicalised Australian teenagers attended public schools*.

Well here's another scoop, and I'm going to borrow from Chris Bonnor, a former state school principal of many years standing and outspoken advocate for public education; more redheads, nurses and footballers have attended state schools. Why? Because two out of every three kids in NSW attend a state school.

Anyway, state schools copped a hammering because, as the article argued, they allow jihadist sentiment to ferment within their walls. A possible solution, spruiked by a sociologist in religion from Southern Cross University within the same paper, was *more* dedicated religious schools where students of the "one faith" can interact "with each other" and talk "about issues" which will all serve as "a vaccination against extremism." Religious apartheid; keep the flocks separate. I must be missing something here as I struggle to see how this will promote tolerance.

A real problem with this argument is of course that, as the My Schools website makes clear, those kids who attend Islamic schools come from above-average socio-educational families. Advantage in family circumstances goes a long way to countering disenfranchisement. The Islamic youth who attend state schools overwhelmingly come from poorer families and, as a result, already experience economic and social marginalisation long before they have started school. It is a tribute to these schools that so very many of their students emerge as productive and valued citizens, people for whom jihadi rhetoric is abhorrent.

There is nothing new about disaffected youth engaging in dangerous behaviours. The first challenge may well be for the wider community – both in the city and beyond the sandstone curtain – to more seriously consider more effective means by which to tackle the root cause; disadvantage.

MATHEMATICS FACULTY TERM 4

The start of Term 4 is full of activity for our classes.

Year 11 are now starting the HSC component of their senior mathematics courses. The scheduled assessment tasks undertaken in the next 4 terms comprise at least 50% of the final HSC mark. Students are encouraged to ask for assistance if needed and reminded of the Monday after school homework room.

Year 10 are sitting a Yearly Examination on Wednesday 14th October. This will take place in the Gymnasium to give students the experience of a formal examination which covers a wide range of topics such as they will encounter in their senior studies. The Mathematics exam will start at 9.05am, so students are reminded to be at school on time and to move directly to the northern side of the Gymnasium at 9.00am.

Year 8 and 9 will also be tested on Wednesday 14th October. These tests will be conducted in class and will assess the students' use of basic skills. Calculators will not be permitted in this assessment.

AUSTRALIAN MATHEMATICS COMPETITION RESULTS

Once again Mudgee High School had a small but high quality group of students accepting this challenge. Our results have once again proved that we have a high calibre of students.

Of the 23 students who attempted the competition the achievements included 2 Distinction awards, 8 Credit awards and 10 Proficiency awards, with other students receiving a certificate of participation.

As we are yet to receive the official certificates, names have been withheld, although it is expected that such information will be available very soon.

Congratulations to all students who showed the eagerness to attempt such a rigorous challenge.

REAL ESTATE VISIT

Towards the end of Term 3, a number of Year 12 Mathematics classes had the opportunity to attend a talk given by one of the local property managers. Steve Goodwin from First National Real Estate provided students with information on leasing a rental property. Steve drew from his extensive experience in property management and also that as a parent of a student who attended university in the city.

Topics covered included the requirements for a lease including ID, bond requirements and referees. The legal obligations and tips to use when choosing a property to lease were also discussed.

Feedback from students was very positive and they found the practical advice very useful for their future.
