#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

This week I want to talk about attendance, but not the givens like good attendance equals children and young people being in a regulated, safe environment that provides routines and structures, as well as trusted and supportive relationships, weighted with ongoing opportunities for positive social, emotional, psychological and cognitive development, not to mention the development of knowledge about concepts and behaviours that can assist in creating better chances for success in later life or anything like that... because they're givens.

I want to talk about the changes that have been made to the ways in which attendance in ALL schools is recorded in 2015.

In the past, schools were able to provide exemptions from attendance to students who were accompanying their parents or carers on overseas holidays during school time. Since January, if parents are planning such a trip, they are required to notify the school in advance and be issued with an Application for Extended Leave – Travel to complete. If approved by the Principal, the parents will be issued with a Certificate of Extended Leave – Travel to take with them. Recent events where one parent or carer has attempted or even succeeded in leaving the country with children the subject of custody issues, as well as issues surrounding the attempts of young people to join foreign organisations like ISIS have prompted these changes. AFP officers and customs officials will want to see the paperwork of any child leaving the country.

From the beginning of 2015, absences of 2 days or more must be explained in writing from a parent or carer. Absences of 3 days or more must be approved by the Principal no matter what the absence reason.

There are no longer enrolment exemptions granted for holidays or funerals, etc.. These are all now recorded as explained leave. The grounds for exemption are very limited now, applying to things like extended incapacity (where the health of a student would render sick leave or alternative enrolment inappropriate, such as a student excluded from school because of a direction under the Public Health Act 2010) and representation in elite, national sports like the Commonwealth Games or the Olympics.

Be aware too that if a student attends an event that the school has not set up as an excursion the absence is listed as "Leave". This will affect students like those who attend equestrian events outside of those that operate as school excursions.

All of these changes are predicated on the need to know where children and young people are and to keep them safe, excellent reasons for making any change.



### YEAR 10 – STUDY 2 UNIT MARINE IN YEAR 11, 2016 THE IMPORTANCE OF CORAL REEFS - STORE OF BIODIVERSITY

Coral reefs are some of the most diverse and valuable ecosystems on Earth. Coral reefs support more species per unit area than any other marine environment, including about 4,000 species of fish, 800 species of hard corals and 100s of other species.

Scientists estimate that there may be another 1-8 million undiscovered species of organisms living in and around reefs. Discover a new species and it can be named after you!!! Mr Willetts knows many people that have discovered new species and have had them named after them.

This biodiversity is considered key to finding new medicines for the 21st Century. Many drugs are now being developed from coral reef animals and plants as possible cures for cancer, arthritis, bacterial infections, viruses, and other diseases.



Spread over 5.7 million square kilometres, the Coral Triangle has the highest diversity of marine life of any area on Earth. It contains three quarters of the world's known coral species, a third of the world's coral reefs, more than 3,000 species of fish and the world's richest mangrove forests. It generates \$2.3 billion in sea products each year and is a major spawning ground for tuna and other valuable species.

#### NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM Mudgee High School Clinic 1- 17<sup>th</sup> March 2015

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program. In 2015 the following vaccines will be offered:

ii 2013 the following vaccines will be offered.
Year 7 students*
☐ dTpa vaccine (Diphtheria, Tetanus & Pertussis (whooping cough)) as a single dose
varicella vaccine (chickenpox) as a single dose; and
human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine in a 3-dose schedule at 0, 2 and 6 months (students who commence HPV vaccination in Year 7 but do not complete the course may be offered catch-up doses at school in Year 8)
Year 11-12 students*
☐ measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine as a single dose as part of a catch-up vaccination program for tudents who are not fully protected.
The Parent Information Kits contain a consent form, information sheet and privacy statement that details how personal information will be collected, stored and utilised.
Parent Information Kits will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:
☐ read all the information provided
complete the consent form in <u>blue or black ink ONLY</u> , including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
return the completed consent form to their child's school
ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.
Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation.

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

Please note that for HPV vaccine only, parents/guardians must record their Medicare Number (all 10 digits and the 11th number beside the child's name) on the consent form, as this is required to record the student's information on the National HPV Vaccination Register and (for female students only) link to the National or State Cervical Screening Program.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic. Parents/guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

#### REPRESENTATIVE SPORT

Already upon us are a number of the CHS and other sporting competitions that have seen students trialling for representative sporting teams. Most sports have competitions for both junior and seniors, so keep an ear out for the announcements and check the PDHPE noticeboard for information on the opportunities available. Western Area team selection trials are also coming up in various sports so if you think you have the skills to be involved, see Miss McCann or the relevant coach of the sport.

If a student is selected, they will be required to attend training and compete at various times. If your child is representing the school in a team, please ensure you and your child are aware of who the coach is, the team training times and competition dates. This should ensure that sporting excursions are well organised and that students gain maximum enjoyment and benefit from participating.

It is important to note that representative Sport is not deemed a compulsory part of the curriculum and as such, our excursion policy states that students may be excluded for misbehaviour or non-compliance with school rules. Sometimes it is necessary for coaches to make judgements about a student's eligibility to represent the school on these types of excursions. Any exclusion will be discussed with the Deputy Principal and communicated to the student.

#### SPORT AND PDHPE UNIFORM

We would just like to remind you and your children that Mudgee High School does implement a Sport Uniform Policy and we look forward to seeing students participating during PDHPE and Sport wearing their red shirt and blue shorts.

Shorts should be of an appropriate length and shoes should be running shoes or sneakers.

All students are encouraged to participate in practical PDHPE and sport lessons. To do this, students must ensure they change into their correct uniform and wear appropriate shoes. At Mudgee High School, if a student does not bring their correct uniform without explanation from their parent/guardian students will:

- not be able to participate in the practical PDHPE or Sport lesson
- be given alternative written work to complete during the lesson
- may be given a detention during recess or lunchtime.

Students who provide an appropriate explanation from their parent/guardian will be asked to complete alternative written work during the lesson. Long term illness or injury will be looked at on a case by case basis to determine an individual plan for the student. Please communicate with the PDHPE staff if your child does have a relevant reason for not participating over an extended period.

If a student does not participate satisfactorily or on a regular basis, a letter will be sent regarding non-participation and they may not be able to satisfactorily meet the requirements of PDHPE or Sport.

Students, when swimming, are asked to wear a rash shirt or t-shirt, and boardshorts, not only for protection from the sun, but to ensure they can actively engage in all activities without the fear of a potentially embarrassing situation.

We encourage the wearing of sunscreen at all times. We also ask that students bring a drink bottle to practical lessons and wear a hat during all outside activities.

#### **YEAR 7 SPORT**

Students in Year 7 participate in Sport within their allocated class group. Sometimes, groups may be timetabled together. The Year 7 Sport program at Mudgee High School is designed to build on the specific skills developed during practical PDHPE lessons and provide an opportunity for students to participate in a variety of activities, both modified and traditional. The emphasis is on participation as well as getting to know others and developing teamwork and interpersonal skills.

There is usually minimal cost for Sport, however, sometimes students may be required to travel to and from a venue at a cost of \$2-3. If there is a cost, this will be communicated to the student prior to the day.

#### YEAR 8-10 SPORT TERM 1

Students in Years 8-10 will be participating in a variety of sports over the course of the year. Students have been placed into groups which have been rotating through the sports each week. This organisation is designed to give students variety and allow them to develop skills in a range of sports. As the year progresses, different sports will be offered and students may be given the chance to choose an area of interest to pursue for a term. Whilst costs are kept to a minimum, it may be that throughout the year your child will require some money to access certain activities. This cost will be communicated as necessary. As always, financial assistance can be applied for through the office.

As outlined previously in this newsletter, Mudgee High School does implement a Sport Uniform Policy and students are reminded that this will be enforced.

Please remember to send students with a hat and an extra water bottle on, especially whilst the weather is still so hot.
