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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

NAIDOC has morphed into a time to celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history, culture and achievements. It is now an opportunity to recognise the contributions that Indigenous Australians make to our country and our society.

Public recognition of these achievements lies at the heart of on-going reconciliation and the raising of awareness of all of the positive things Australian Indigenous cultures bring to the wider community.

In other news, it's Week 10.

On Tuesday, those students who have achieved Gold Level will be the benefactors of our reward afternoon. There is more information on Reward Day on page 2 of this newsletter. TAS COMPUTING

There was much excitement recently when we were advised, at short notice, the carpets were to be replaced in our two main computer rooms. The rooms were stripped bare, including the built-in computer benches, in double quick time. There was a sea of cables, computers, monitors, desks and books left that had to be reassembled the following day. This too was completed in double quick time and the disruption to regular lessons was kept to a minimum. Thanks to everyone pitching in and the co-operation of students, the whole process ran very smoothly. This also gave us the opportunity to tidy up and clean out some resources that had passed their use-by dates and has made the computer learning environment much more pleasant.



Among the many interesting resources we have available to us are a number of Lego robotics kits. While they are still quite functional and are able to be used by students to learn the fundamentals of robotics and solve some real world problems the technology has moved on. We are in the process of ordering updated kits that include features such as sound and infrared sensors along with the usual touch and light sensors. This will make it possible to complete much more complex problems and with the updated software and interface, the solutions can be much more interesting and allow the students to really demonstrate their high order thinking.




