PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Assemblies

Mudgee High is a Positive Behaviours for Learning (PBL) school.

In a nutshell, PBL demands that we as educators explicitly teach students the behaviours we expect them to demonstrate. PBL demands that we not assume knowledge.

And it makes perfect sense!

Behavioural expectations are like cultural norms. No baby is born with a knowledge of the cultural practices that lie at the heart of the community into which he or she has been delivered. Language and ideas, customs and art, the particular social behaviours of a particular people or society are all learned. Behaviour is very much a fundamental of culture. No child is born knowing "please" and "thank you". None but the dullest fail to learn through explicit teaching and life experience the figurative doors these words have the capacity to open.

PBL at Mudgee High has at its core three universals: Safe. Respectful. Responsible.

These universals were decided several years ago after wide-ranging consultation with the school community; staff, students and parents.

The universals serve as an overarching guide as to what positive behaviours should generate; a safe environment in which people act responsibly and respectfully.

What PBL looks like in practice differs from context to context and this is something that needs to be taught, even when it may seem a "no-brainer". A behaviour accepted on the school oval at lunchtime like kicking a football is not going to be acceptable in the school's library. While this may seem obvious – and to tell the truth, it is an extreme example – there are a fringe minority of students who will ask, "Why?" when a behaviour the majority would consider not safe, responsible or respectful is challenged.

PBL allows us to talk to all students about what we want to see – the positive behaviours – rather than the listing all of the "don'ts".

I kicked off a few weeks ago a little explicit teaching of the behavioural expectations we have of students on assembly in the most appropriate of contexts... an assembly. Those expectations are really quite simple.

To be safe, we expect students to:

Follow staff instructions. Enter and exit by the correct gymnasium door. Sit where directed.

To be respectful, we expect students to:

Listen attentively. Acknowledge achievements appropriately.

To be responsible, we expect students to:

Move quickly to assembly. Leave bags where directed.

Fleshed out with the reasoning behind these expectations and examples, which were then followed up last week by Mr Browning with a reminder of those expectations, no student present was left in doubt as to what is expected of them.

PBL lessons serve to make students aware of the school's culture as well as make MHS a nicer place to be.

What is Love Bites?


- Love Bites is an extremely successful, school-based sexual assault, domestic and family violence prevention program that evolved on the Mid Coast of NSW
- Over 10,000 high school students throughout NSW have participated in this interactive and innovative program aimed at Year 10 students.

The Love Bites Program consists of two interactive workshops on sexual assault and family / domestic violence and then workshops that consolidate the information from the morning workshops by working alongside the students to produce artworks that will then be printed on posters, coasters and resources for the students and community.

The artworks, music and radio advertisements from all students are used to develop a local campaign to challenge violence against women in the community. This campaign is led and delivered by young people. The Love Bites program presents a consistent approach to the issues of violence against women and children that is firmly focused on factual statistical information that consistently confirms that sexual assault and domestic violence are gender issues as women are overwhelmingly the victims of men's violence and that men are overwhelmingly the perpetrators of this violence. Love Bites advocates that young people can change these statistics and can make different choices, resolve issues in non-violent ways and can develop respectful relationships.

The program will involve all of Year 10. Students will be placed into three groups. Each group will then participate in a one day workshop that will take place over three days in Week 7, Term 4.
