#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

I am going to begin this week's newsletter with a thank you... a big thank you. Thank you to all those students – the vast majority - who have the common sense to realise that in a man v. car encounter on the road, 1500kg of steel, rubber, plastic and glass moving at 40km/h trumps 60kg of bone, muscle, blood and sinew. Thank you so very much to those same students – and their parents – for developing such a keen sense of self-preservation that the thought of crossing the road without looking to see whether it is safe to do so is so foreign to them as to be almost inconceivable.

... and brickbats to the rest.

Both Mr Browning and I have reminded students on assemblies of the need to exercise due care and diligence when on or near a road following a couple of near misses earlier in the year. I'm now asking you – the parents and carers – to reinforce the message at home if you're not already doing so. There are students at this school who exercise a kind of bovine road etiquette, students who seem to feel that there is safety in numbers, safety within the herd, who will nonchalantly wander into the path of a vehicle. They do so seemingly clueless to the peril in which they place themselves and heedless to the stress their actions places on drivers.

 $\dots$  and it seems in the five or so minutes that follow 3.25pm, when lessons have ended for the day, that this bovine road etiquette manifests itself in the worst way.

At present there are substantial earthworks taking place in Winter Street. The spoil from these works is being moved to Glen Willow. This movement necessitates trucks using Douro Street to transport the spoil; trucks with a gross weight exceeding 40 tonnes... 40,000kg. Even travelling at 40km/h, a physical showdown with that above mentioned 60kg person can really only have one outcome; and that's a lay down misere result.

Last Thursday afternoon, a group of students numbering perhaps fifty, reported to me by a shaken truck driver, wandered into the path of such a vehicle near where Horatio and Douro Streets intersect. If not for the quick thinking of that driver, Mudgee High School could have been the scene of an awful tragedy.

I will talk to the students on assembly again about this most recent event. I will talk to them again about the potential for catastrophe; the potential for tragedy. The problem is, these kinds of events are never so serious as after they have occurred; after they have happened. The students who heed advice will continue to heed the advice offered and a fringe, that oblivious minority who think I'm talking about someone else and only then if they hear me at all, will continue to place themselves at risk.

So please, talk about it at home – one on one. Let's see if in partnership we can make a difference to the casual, potentially fatal approach a very few of the kids in our community have to road safety, and turn them around in their thinking before it's too late.

Finally, well done to the students who represented the school at the Lithgow Festival of Speech last week. It was the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this well-supported event and so very good to see our teams and individuals do well. The debaters had three wins arguing the merits of topics like "Australia should adopt the same gun laws as the U.S." and "Offshore processing should be banned in Australia", a real non sequitur given if it's occurring offshore how can it be banned *in* Australia? A stand-out on the day was Ethan Spice from Year 11. Ethan beat speakers from a range of both private and state schools spread from the Blue Mountains through Lithgow to Bathurst and Orange, to become the senior public speaking winner.

Mudgee High School supports full school uniform to promote equality and uniformity. With the change of season comes some confusion over what is correct uniform. Below is some information outlining what is acceptable and what is not acceptable. Thanks for your support!

# Mudgee High School Uniforms 2016

#### **UNIFORM POLICY**

After extensive consultation with the Mudgee High School Council, the P & C Association, students and staff, it has been established that the Mudgee High School community believes that school uniform is a desirable feature of our school for the following reasons:

- Safety of students intruders into the school grounds can be easily identified if all students wear the required school uniform. Given the recent experiences here and overseas this is vital. On excursions students in uniform are easily identifiable and more effectively and safely supervised.
- Learning social responsibility students need to learn that sometimes the welfare of the whole society over-rides the individual beliefs of some of its members e.g. road rules.
- **To promote a positive image to our community** which will in turn benefit our students e.g. offers of support for work experience placement, sponsorship, employment.
- Training for the workplace where uniform and acceptable dress is
- To prevent competition in clothing between students and provide a low cost clothing option.

The Mudgee High School community has therefore determined that this school is a uniform school. Students are required to wear full school uniform every day and to bring to school a written explanation from their parent/carer on each occasion they are out of uniform.

## PDHPE AND SPORT UNIFORM

 Students are to wear sports uniform for all practical PE lessons – if this is not possible, students should wear clothes similar to the sports uniform and appropriate for a practical lesson and bring an explanatory note from home.

## BOYS Uniform:

- Grey shorts with the school badge OR grey trousers (track pants or ruggers are NOT permitted).
- A white polo shirt with embroidered badge OR business style shirt.
- Navy blue MHS school jumper or navy blue sloppy joe with the school badge (no hoods).
- Navy weatherproof jacket with the school badge.
- Hats are recommended for protection from the sun.
- Black or white shoes which must be enclosed and comply with Work, Health and Safety Requirements which require that the upper toe section of the shoe be leather or leather like.
- Sport Uniform: all students to wear red polo shirt with school badge, navy blue shorts with MHS embroidery or navy track pants.

# Senior Option

• Polo shirt may have navy collar with red stripes. A navy jumper OR deep red jumper with embroidered badge for seniors OR navy blue sloppy joe with the school badge (**no hoods**).

## GIRLS Uniform:

- Navy skirt OR navy dress shorts with the school badge OR navy dress pants (track pants or ruggers are NOT permitted).
- A white polo shirt with embroidered badge OR business style shirt.
- Navy blue MHS school jumper or navy blue sloppy joe with the school badge (no hoods).
- Navy weatherproof jacket with the school badge.
- Hats are recommended for protection from the sun.
- Black or white shoes must be enclosed and comply with Work, Health and Safety Requirements which require that the upper toe section of the shoe be leather.
- Sport Uniform: all students to wear red polo shirt with school badge, navy blue shorts with MHS embroidery or navy track pants.

# No commercial logos, stripes or other decorations are permitted.

Please make sure all articles of clothing are marked with student's name. Where students are unable to wear full uniform a note must be brought to roll call and a uniform pass will be issued. Where full sports uniform cannot be worn students must provide a note from a parent. Those without approved sports uniform will attend non-sport.
