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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Asgard Calling!

Year 12's time with us draws to a close this Friday. Sure they've still the state-wide HSC quizzes to sit in October and a graduation dinner at Parklands in November, but their days in classes, playing handball at lunchtime and generally being kids will be at an end.

But before they tumble from the nest and test those new wings, I thought I'd say a little about the rainbow.

Rainbows are of course a prismatic effect, caused by sunlight passing through raindrops, splitting the white light of the sun into the range of visible light we perceive from red through violet.

That's the technical side of rainbows, but they are much more than that.

Rainbows have been powerful things in human mythology for millennia.

The Aborigines saw the rainbow as a giant serpent. In the rainbow's curve they saw the creator of rain, the maker of rivers and the giver of all life.

In the Northern Hemisphere, Greek mythology had it that the rainbow was a means by which messages from the gods on Mt Olympus could be delivered to mere mortals like you and I. The Vikings called the rainbow Bilfrost. In it they saw a bridge. This bridge joined Midgard – the world of Earth – to Asgard – Viking heaven. Bilfrost was a means by which warriors slain in battle could make their way to heaven. In heaven they could fight all day and even if killed again, they would rise at the close of day, retire to Valhalla and drink themselves silly through all eternity. I think it fair to say that the Viking afterlife sounds quite tiring!

In the Judeo-Christian tradition, according to the Book of Genesis and on God's command, Noah saved the animals from the Great Flood. When the rains ceased a rainbow appeared. The Great Flood must have been a shocker because it reportedly killed all other living beings not on board the Arc. The rainbow came to symbolise God's promise that he would never again send a flood to destroy all living things. It symbolically came to represent a covenant – a kind of peace treaty – between man and God.

Rainbow Day for the students of Mudgee High School and indeed the Mudgee community has also come to be a symbol. While many schools experience the stupidity and wanton vandalism of "muck up" days, a day on which the very people who have been nurtured so as to become the fine young adults they are turn on the very place that has done so much for them; literally biting the hand that has fed.

It's a bizarre practice, seldom tolerated by school authorities and certainly not endured by the police.

But here at Mudgee High and since its humble beginnings in 2002, Year 12 have finished their school days in the most positive of ways.

RAINBOW DAY!

This year, Year 12 have and continue to raise funds for the NSW Ambulance Service and the theatre department of Mudgee Hospital.

So, if you're in town on Thursday morning between 08:00 and 09:15, watch out for the coindrop roadside stations – there will be three of them. It will almost certainly be raining but that's not an entirely bad thing because you don't get a rainbow without rain.

Big decisions ahead for Year 11

Year 11 have just completed the examinations that mark the end of the preliminary year, but this leaves them with some choices to make. In English students may want to change level – from Advanced to Standard or from Standard to English Studies. Extension 1 students may want to pick up an extra unit and enrol in Extension 2 – the major work.

These are important choices because they are binding: the HSC courses begin on Day One of Term Four and students need to be in the right course by then. There are few chances to change once the term begins.

Next week, students will be asked to make a decision about the level of English they will study for the HSC. Some students are really clear about this but others need some help: parents, this is where you come in.

You can help by having a discussion about:

• Future plans: is a particular level of English a pre-requisite for a realistic goal that they have? For example, English Studies is an HSC course, but it doesn't allow you to get an ATAR – a university entrance rank.

• Current achievement: how well are they doing in their current course? If their achievement is not what they would like, do they have enough time to commit to improvement? Do they use tutoring Tuesday? (This is the free tutoring time from 3.30 to 4.30 on Tuesday afternoons) Is the course too difficult?

• Learning styles: You know your child best: do they need to have a challenge? Do they do their best when they feel totally in command of the work? What are they interested in?

• Expert advice: At Mudgee High we have many years of experience in the HSC – and we're here to help. If your young adult is unsure about which English course would suit them, and you don't know what to do for the best, please get in touch with us. We know the rules and the potential pitfalls.
