PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The display of Major Works from Industrial Technology Multimedia, Industrial Technology Timber, Society and Culture, Textiles and Visual Arts was another success this year with a great many people through the doors over the four days it was open.

Every year the works on display demonstrate clearly the wealth of talent possessed by the youth of Mudgee, as well as reflect the excellent guidance provided by the experienced teaching staff who have worked so closely with the kids to produce the work on show. It would be remiss of me not to acknowledge the work of teaching staff and students in bringing the show together, the support of the P&C in paying for the hire of the gallery, and a very big thank you too to the Year 11 Hospitality class that catered the event's opening on Monday evening.

Well done our captains 2018 – Adam O'Connell, Olive Loughnan and Tom Loughnan – who looked very smart in their blazers and ties at the RSL's Remembrance Day service in Robertson Park on Saturday 11/11. They represented well their school and community.



Money is often a contributing factor in a relationship failure. So, at some small risk, I'm going to talk money in my newsletter spiel this week and trust that the relationship the school has with its parent and carer partners will still be strong afterwards.

Specifically, I want to talk about fees and contributions.

Each year, Mudgee High levies a voluntary contribution as well as fees for courses that sit outside "the minimum requirements of the curriculum" as per section 1.4 of the DoE's policy titled *Voluntary School Contribution*.

The voluntary contribution we seek assists us in the daily operation of the school. It is considerably less than that sought by a great many other comprehensive secondary schools and, although not compulsory, it is very much appreciated.

The fees charged for courses that students elect to do, beginning in Year 8, are made clear in our fees schedule which is part of the subject selection guides. The schedule has been ratified by the school's P&C. The contribution and levies scheduled have not been increased for several years.

No fees are charged in Year 7. Sure, there is a request for the voluntary contribution (see above), but that is all. Students will use materials in courses like Tech. Mandatory cooking and sewing and woodwork... but Tech. Mandatory is, as its name makes clear, a mandatory course that all students are obliged to undertake. As such, it sits well within the "minimum requirements".

So, when a course is an elective, it sits outside of the "the minimum requirements of the curriculum". Not all electives attract a fee; only those where students will use things like eggs and milk, wood and steel, to produce items they will take home when complete.

Additionally, senior students (Years 11 and 12) who have completed their final year of compulsory schooling (minimum requirements again) and elected to undertake HSC studies, are required to pay a senior textbook deposit that is fully refunded when those texts are returned at the conclusion of their study. Some students in the senior school elect to undertake study of one courses or another not offered at MHS but available through Distance Education Dubbo or another provider. These courses too come with costs – usually around \$200 for the year to cover the postage of materials. Naturally, in a system that is a public institution made available to anyone who can demonstrate Australian citizenship or residency covered by an appropriate visa classification, there is some provision for parents and carers who find it difficult to pay for elective subjects because of financial hardship. In some instances, the school may be in a position to offer financial assistance. All a parent or carer in such a situation need do is ask.

With regard to the payment of fees and voluntary contributions, the best place to look is the Department of Educations I have provided the DoE's policy precis as well as the link to the full policy:


For our local community, the SRC will also be contributing to the Christmas gifting program through Barnardos. Each roll call group will be given a gift

Year 10 'LOVE BITES' Parent Information

The Love Bites sexual assault and domestic violence prevention program will run for Year 10 in conjunction with the PD/H/PE core subject. Outlined below is some information on the program. What is Love Bites?

- Love Bites is an extremely successful, school based sexual assault, domestic and family violence prevention program that evolved on the Mid Coast of NSW
- Over 10,000 high school students throughout NSW have participated in this interactive and innovative program aimed at Year 10 students

The Love Bites Program consists of two interactive workshops on sexual assault and family/domestic violence and then workshops that consolidate the information from the morning workshops by working alongside the students to produce artworks that will then be printed on posters and resources for the students and community.

The artworks, music and radio advertisements from all students are used to develop a local campaign to challenge violence against women in the community. This campaign is led and delivered by young people.

The Love Bites program presents a consistent approach to the issues of violence against women and children that is firmly focused on factual statistical information that consistently confirm that sexual assault and domestic violence are gender issues as women are overwhelmingly the victims of men's violence and that men are overwhelmingly the perpetrators of this violence. Love Bites advocates that young people can change these statistics and can make different choices, resolve issues in non-violent ways and can develop respectful relationships.

The program will involve all of Year 10 who will be placed into three groups. Each group will then participate in a one day workshop that will take place over three days in Week 7. Term 4.

REMEMBRANCE DAY 2017

With Remembrance Day 2017 falling on a Saturday, students and staff at Mudgee High School commemorated the occasion on Wednesday 8th. The school community was honoured to host Mr David Lester.

Mr Lester, who was a student of Mudgee High School between 1941 and 1944, is a first generation descendant of Mr Bruce Lester who served with the Australian Light Horse 4th Regiment in the Sinai Desert during World War I. It was the Anzac Mounted Division's 4th and 12th Light Horse Regiments that conducted a mounted infantry charge at Beersheba on 31st October, 1917. The Light Horsemen's only weapons for the mounted attack were their bayonets, as their rifles were slung across their backs. One part of the two regiments dismounted to attack the positions on Tel es Saba defending Beersheba. The remainder of the Light Horsemen continued their charge into the town, capturing it and a sizeable part of the garrison as it attempted to withdraw.

Mr Lester and his daughter, Robbie Holdaway, recently returned from Beersheba, which is now part of Israel, after participating in the centenary commemorations of the charge that included a re-enactment of the event.

At Mudgee High School's Remembrance Day ceremony, Mr Lester explained the significance of the battle to students, and the importance of our country's ties with Israel. He also made it known that at the commemoration there were four former students of Mudgee High who had direct familial links to the men of the Light Horse who had captured Beersheba.

Mr Lester's presence at the ceremony was greatly appreciated by the students and reinforced the importance of commemorating the both the duty and sacrifice of others in times of war.


