#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Team PBL (Positive Behaviour for Learning) has been very busy for some time now, developing with both students and staff a shared understanding of what constitutes positive behaviours under the universal headings of Safe, Respectful and Responsible.

Each week there is a dedicated focus on a particular area or type of behaviour that makes explicit the expectations of all students.

This week's focus is on canteen etiquette; what it looks like to be safe, respectful and responsible when at the canteen.

Students are safe at the canteen when they follow staff instructions, wait behind the yellow line before being called to a serving window, queue at the appropriate window, and leave the area once purchases have been made.

Students are respectful at the canteen when they show politeness to the staff and students working at the canteen, and use manners in all transactions – a "please" when making a request and a "thank you" for the service received.

Students are responsible at the canteen when they make and then pay for their own purchases, and use garbage bins to dispose of waste.

This stuff may seem a "no-brainer" to the majority of us but the point of PBL is that unless positive behaviours are made explicit through teaching, how can they be an expectation?

While talking of PBL, it is worthwhile touching on a number of developments from the past few weeks.

All students should be familiar now with the concept of "Get ready!" Through our pastoral care meetings that follow roll call in roll call classes, students have gone through what is expected of them if they are to be ready to learn at the beginning of every lesson. Additionally, all learning spaces carry a "Get Ready!" reminder in a prominent place. I have included an image of the "Get ready!" reminder in this newsletter.

The "Get ready!" reminder was the product of a survey of all teaching staff members, asking them what student preparedness for lessons should look like.

Additionally, new signage went up over the weekend that provides behavioural cues. The signage, provided by Cactus Signs, is very professional and makes explicit our expectations of behaviour in a variety of areas including passive areas, active areas, transit areas (no place for loitering) and so forth. .....and finally.

Yet another study has found Australian private schools produce no better results than public schools, when students' socio-economic backgrounds are taken into account.

Stéphane Mahuteau and Kostas Mavromaras, academics at Adelaide's Flinders University, have discovered a strong and positive association between the socio-economic status of students and their test scores. What their research made clear was that, after controlling for a number of school and student characteristics, "school quality does not depend directly on the sector of the school"...code for the time and again proven fact

that a private school education offers very little of benefit over a public school education. Sure, there might be an undercover equestrian centre. 50m heated swimming pool, Pilates room and a barista to supply Phoebe and Miles with a delightful latte during library study, but the academic results achieved demonstrate no real variance. The main determinant in achieving higher test scores has far more to do with the socioeconomic status (SES) of students the report found; familial expectation. So, is Mudgee High a good school?



It is worth noting that in 2017, Mudgee High's Year 9 student average growth – a measurement of "value-adding" – in NAPLAN reading was 43.2 points compared to 38.6 points for ALL Year 9 students in ALL educational sectors (state, Catholic and independent schools). In Numeracy, Mudgee High's Year 9 student average growth in NAPLAN was 61.1 points compared to 52.4 points for ALL Year 9 students in ALL educational sectors. This is no statistical anomaly. In 2016, the figures for reading and numeracy growth were 34.2 v 33.2 and 47 v 40.7 respectively. In fact, the data available suggests an increasing positive gap in "value-added" performance at Mudgee High over the last three years.

The smart choice, as demonstrated by the Flinders University research and the results achieved by students at this very school, would seem a comprehensive public school education. This can be undertaken while parents and carers save their cash so that they may be in a better position to assist their kids with post-school choices... or be in a better position to take a long holiday when the nest is finally empty!

### Year 10 'LOVE BITES' Parent Information

The Love Bites sexual assault and domestic violence prevention program will run for Year 10 in conjunction with the PD/H/PE core subject. Outlined below is some information on the program. #### What is Love Bites?

- Love Bites is an extremely successful, school based sexual assault, domestic and family violence prevention program that evolved on the Mid Coast of NSW
- Over 10,000 high school students throughout NSW have participated in this interactive and innovative program aimed at Year 10 students

The Love Bites Program consists of two interactive workshops on sexual assault and family/domestic violence and then workshops that consolidate the information from the morning workshops by working alongside the students to produce artworks that will then be printed on posters and resources for the students and community.

The artworks, music and radio advertisements from all students are used to develop a local campaign to challenge violence against women in the community. This campaign is led and delivered by young people.

The Love Bites program presents a consistent approach to the issues of violence against women and children that is firmly focused on factual statistical information that consistently confirm that sexual assault and domestic violence are gender issues as women are overwhelmingly the victims of men's violence and that men are overwhelmingly the perpetrators of this violence. Love Bites advocates that young people can change these statistics and can make different choices, resolve issues in non-violent ways and can develop respectful relationships.

The program will involve all of Year 10 who will be placed into three groups. Each group will then participate in a one day workshop that will take place over three days in Week 7, Term 4.
