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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Have you seen the new basketball courts? If you're passing the school in Denison Street, make sure you look out for the new courts. With the assistance of the P&C, a community partnership grant and the dogged persistence of a couple of staff members from the PDHPE Faculty, what was a neglected piece of school infrastructure is now a state-of-the-art, fit-for-purpose facility. It's well worth a look.

In addition to the Secondary Schools Renewal Program works around the school (see below) we have also been working on some other in-house renovations that will improve the amenity of the place. The mini gymnasium in the northeast corner of the school, adjacent to the bus shed, is now insulated and has had additional concrete paving installed to provide an additional facility that can be used year-round. The Performance Centre is being refurbed, including repaired and repainted walls, a new electronic screen to compliment the audio visual improvements made last year, refurbished stage curtains and a recarpeted stage.

A well-cared for physical environment is indisputable evidence that someone cares. We want our students and indeed the wider Mudgee community to know that we care.

And now, a history lesson...

Augury was a regular practice in ancient Roman religion. The Romans believed that the future could be known through the interpretation of birds in flight. The individual charged with these divinations was called an augur. The augur's observations were referred to as taking "the auspices". Depending upon the birds seen, the auspices from the gods would be determined as favourable or unfavourable.

One of the more famous accounts of augury at work is the one connected to the founding of Rome. Romulus and Remus, the brothers who legend tells us founded Rome, were said to have arrived at the Palatine Hill, where they argued over where exactly the city should be sited. Romulus was keen to build the city upon the Palatine Hill. Remus on the other hand wanted to build the city on what he saw as the far more defendable Aventine Hill. The two agreed to settle their argument by testing their abilities as augurs. Remus reportedly saw six vultures, while Romulus saw twelve.

Problem solved; twelve trumps six. Building commenced at Palatine...

If that all sounds daft, then we're on the same page.

Divining and deducing, relying on prophesy and soothsaying, peering into the tea leaves or the entrails of dead beasts... none of it is particularly scientific and I'm almost certain will not reveal the hitherto unknown.

So where is this going? There are times when children – adults too – behave in ways that no reasonable person would consider, well, reasonable. Chief amongst these immoderate behaviours would have to be bullying; the systematic and prolonged harassment of another person through threats and intimidation, words and actions.

You should be in no doubt that when we are made aware of these types of behaviours manifesting at school, we are very quick to respond. We do all that is reasonable to stop such acts cold. No one should have to come either to school or to work and feel miserable at the prospect of another day of being subjected to these types of behaviours, whether from another individual or a group.

That said, sometimes we only find out that such a situation has developed well after the fact. In these situations, sometimes we are asked, "Why hasn't the school done something?"

We need your help. We have no augurs. We have no tealeaf readers. We have no seers or mediums with high def. crystal balls. Until we are aware there is a problem there is no problem. We need those affected to seek assistance; to speak up early so that action can be taken quickly.

If this is done, the chances of resolving positively any negative issue grow exponentially.

NATIONAL YOUTH SCIENCE FORUM - ANDREA HOLDEN

The National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) is a Rotary Australia initiative which brings together 400 of the country's brightest scientific students over 2 two weeks sessions in January each year. Mudgee High's Andrea Holden was one of the 400 accepted of over 2000 students interviewed nationally and internationally and was supported in her endeavours by the Rotary Club of Mudgee.

"Without the support of not only Mudgee Rotary, but also Rotary as a national organisation, I would not have been able to attend such a well renowned event that exposed me to such up to date science innovations and inventions" Andrea said.

While in Canberra, students were given the opportunity to meet several esteemed scientists and hear about their journeys and the scientific discoveries they have made. One of the highlights was hearing from 2011 Physics Nobel Prize winner, Brian Schmidt, who focused on the expanding Universe and the relationship between atoms, dark matter, and dark energy. *"Being exposed to brilliant minds such as Nobel Prize winner Brian Schmidt was an amazing privilege and provided great motivation for my personal scientific ambitions,"* said Andrea.

One of the goals of the forum is to expose the students to a great number of branches of scientific research and to demonstrate the real life applications science has for everyday life. Andrea's likely field of study will be biomedical engineering in which Australians have recently made world advances in areas such as cochlear implants making hearing available to many in the world that potentially would never be able to hear. Andrea said that she "would like to think that my study would be able to translate into practical applications that assist people to improve their everyday lives."

Andrea now aims to join an elite group of international science students in London for the London International Youth Science Forum (LIYSF) for two weeks in August 2017. *"I learnt so much at the Canberra forum, and left feeling so inspired by all of the knowledge I have gained, I am now aiming for the London International Youth Science Forum to*

further my understanding and aspirations in the science fields." The LIYSF brings together 500 of the world's brightest science students and recently has helped develop and inspire some of the world's most brilliant scientific minds.

Who can apply?

Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people aged 16 to 25 years who are willing to stand up and speak about important issues, work as part of a team, travel to new places, meet new people and learn.

Letter of support

All applications must include a letter of support from your teacher or tutor, employer, coach, youth worker, community leader, family friend or other referee.

NATIONAL APOLOGY DAY

Monday 13th February is the National Apology Day. This event marks the anniversary of the Apology to Australia's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the House of Representatives on 13 February 2008 by then Prime Minister, Kevin Rudd.

The Apology related to past laws, policies and practices which have impacted on Australia's First Nations Peoples, particularly members of the Stolen Generations. The motion was supported by the Opposition and passed through both houses of Parliament. Brendan Nelson (former Leader of the Opposition) gave a formal response.

Many members of the Stolen Generations were present in the Chamber to hear the Apology and thousands more filled the Great Hall of Parliament House and flowed out onto the lawns to watch it on big screens. The Apology was broadcast across Australia. Mudgee High School acknowledged this day on the whole school assembly on Wednesday. Cody Arnol and Ricky Maynard presented an excellent speech to the whole school to explain what the day is about and the significance of this day. Both boys are to be congratulated on their public speaking skills.

Year 7 NSW School Vaccination Program 2017

Each year NSW Health works with schools to offer the vaccines recommended for adolescents by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC). In 2017, the following vaccines will be offered:

Year 7 students*

- dTpa vaccine (Diphtheria, Tetanus & Pertussis (whooping cough)) as a single dose
- varicella vaccine (chickenpox) as a single dose; and
- human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine in a 3-dose schedule at 0, 2 and 6 months for male and female students.

* The Parent Information Kits contain a consent form, information sheet and privacy statement that details how personal information will be collected, stored and utilised.

Parental/guardian consent is required for students to be vaccinated. Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school or telephoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at <u>www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation</u>. Consent forms will only be accepted if they are completed using blue or black pen and are original (photocopied or faxed consent forms will not be accepted).

Parent Information Kits have been distributed to all Year 7 students. Please ensure the consent forms are returned to the school and placed in the box in the front office as soon as possible. This is a key element to the success of the program. A 'Record of Vaccination' will be given to each child and it is important they provide this to their doctor to ensure that records are kept up to date. To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible. Students who commence HPV vaccination in Year 7 but do not complete the course may be offered catch-up doses at school into Year 8. The Parent Information Kits have been translated for parents/guardians into 26 community languages and are available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation. However, only the English-language consent form should be completed.


