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### Fake news and alternative facts

Anyone familiar with George Orwell will at once recognise the word newspeak. Coined by Orwell in his seminal dystopic satire, *Nineteen Eighty-Four*, newspeak quickly entered the lexicon. It refers to what is often ambiguous, euphemistic language used chiefly in political propaganda.

Sadly, newspeak is alive and well in 2017.

Increasingly we see and hear media commentators referring to "fake news" and "alternative facts." While fake news probably does not strictly constitute newspeak given the pejorative nature of "fake," alternative facts most certainly does. When thousands of climate scientists around the planet agree that anthropogenic climate change is real, the fringe arguing that human activity has no effect on climate seek to label their refutation as "alternative facts". It would be nice to think that they are in denial, a natural enough response given the overwhelming scale of what is arguably the most pressing issue facing human kind, because if they are not in denial, they are simply lying.

The reality of alternative facts is that they are not alternative facts; they are lies. As such, they are of no more use in arriving at an informed understanding than is fake news.

Unfortunately, information and misinformation look so much alike these days. Perhaps it is because we live in an age when anyone with a keyboard and a platform – a website, blog or social media account – can be published and read by hundreds, thousands or even millions of others. It is estimated that 90% or all news consumed now comes via Facebook and Google. Little wonder *Fairfax* is shedding jobs. The days of professional journalism seem numbered.

The biggest pitfall for kids, particularly when researching in what is now an information-rich world, is the reliability of that information. For example, if you search "Who writes Wikipedia?" the answer provided on the Wikipedia site is:

You do! ... anyone can be bold and edit an existing article or create a new one, and volunteers do not need to have any formal training (and) Almost all Wikipedians are volunteers.

If they have not been already, alarm bells should now be ringing. Think about it: Volunteers who need not possess any formal training produce perhaps the most used information source on the planet, Wikipedia. Without professionalism, what happens to the principles of good research and accurate reporting? What happens to ethics?

At Mudgee High, we are looking to wean students off Wikipedia. Many teachers at MHS already regularly provide students with lists of previewed websites that can be used to better flesh out understanding in a range of contexts.

We are now adding an exciting new resource.

This year we have secured a resource called *Britannica Online*. The same people who have been writing the *Encyclopaedia Britannica* for more than 250 years produce it. Accessible at both school and at home via a user name and login, it promises to bring a great deal more accuracy to the research our students undertake.

Like all good things it costs, but it promises to be a great weapon in the fight against fake news and alternative facts.

### **ATHLETICS CARNIVAL 2017**



#### BRITANNICA SCHOOL ONLINE COMES TO MHS

Information in our modern world is not in short supply. With over 4 billion pages of information on the internet, it is not possible for one person to 'click' (not read) every page available online in a lifetime. If you add information that is 'entertain news' and 'fake news' disguised as real news in small 'news bites' spread rapidly through social media formats like Facebook, then information for all of us becomes a minefield of both excess and validity.

A humorous example of this is the case of two American teenage boys that decided to change the facts on Wikipedia. They literally wrote themselves into history as the people that had devised the mathematical formula for x-rays. This 'contribution to humanity' went unchecked or validated for two years. In that time it was taken up 'as fact' by Google and their names also managed to grace the pages of several medical websites around the world. Eventually, the truth came out. Imagine how many school assignments also managed to write both boys names into historical fact?


Wikipedia has its place and Google certainly has become the information highway of the digital age. However, sourcing and providing quality information for young people is the challenge.

To assist our students to access and utilise quality information for class and assignment work, Mudgee High School has just invested in a digital version of 'Britannica School Online' for our school community. This is available for use at school and at home to students at no cost. We believe this is an investment in our digital citizens of the future. Britannica School Online works like a 'search engine' for finding information and provides that information as text, videos and images. It also allows students to choose between three different levels of information (Primary, Middle and High), that will cater to just about any academic need. It is much more than just an encyclopaedia but based in its origins and reputation as one of the most reputable encyclopaedias in the world.

Britannica School Online can be accessed by students at home through a link on our school website www.mudgee-h.schools.nsw.edu.au/ or by accessing it directly at http://school.eb.com.au/ on the internet. It is also easily located on all school computers as a saved 'shortcut'.

Once on the site, students will be prompted for a username (logon) and password. These will be emailed to all students through their DET Student Portal this week. The logon details can also be obtained from Library staff at any time.

As we move forward with Britannica Online within our school this year, staff will be asking students to utilise the resource for research tasks within school and at home where internet is available.
