PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Word of the Day

Several years ago, an idea was thrown up at an executive meeting – our regular Monday meeting of Head Teachers, Deputy Principals and the Principal – about including in day notices a "Word of the Day". The thought that underpinned this was a desire to stretch student vocabularies; to improve their lexical capacity.

After all, words are important.

The ability to communicate through words is what makes us human. Robotic machines on the surface of Mars have the capacity to snap and send images of the environment in which they find themselves, thanks to the ingenuity of a multitude of scientists. However, the ability to capture a moment in well-chosen nouns and verbs, working in partnership with their attendant adjectives and adverbs, and all in cogent order... that's a human thing.

Words allow us to explore the abstract in a way no image ever can. Consider the simplicity and the majesty of Shakespeare's weighing up the value of a continued existence when life seems a procession of indignities, slights and heartbreaks: "To be or not to be – that is the question."

Words provide us the capacity for stories and the ability to share those stories not just with each other but indeed across geographical divides and the temporal gulfs of decades, centuries and millennia. Through words we are permitted to explore the memories of people long dead. Words have the power to allow us to experience thoughts and feelings well beyond our own, engendering empathy and connecting us to the human condition; all of the things that make us human.

Words are the stuff of imagination. They are the tools by which practice can be passed on to new generations. They are the nuts and bolts of the canon of all human endeavour.

In a world increasingly dominated by status updates, 144 word tweets and Instagram image sharing, words would seem to have declined in importance. But within the realms of science, technology, engineering and the arts, words are as important today as they have ever been.

So at each morning roll call, young people at Mudgee High have been and will continue to be exposed to words that at times will be familiar, but more often than not unfamiliar. They will be exposed to the meanings of those words and, just as importantly, their etymology.

Feel free to test your kids regularly on what any given day's Word of the Day was. See whether they can surprise with their attentiveness. By the way, if you want to know what the Word of the Day is on a given day, just keep an eye on the electronic noticeboard in Douro Street.

Last week's words included mucid, plebiscite and prolix. This week's words include facile, wax and wane.

Finally, well done Year 12's Azrun Paulson! Azrun is quite a community-spirited and well-performing HSC student who made application for the Dame Marie Bashir Peace Award this year. It is with great pleasure that I make it public here that Azrun was one of four recipients state-wide to earn a Highly Commended certificate, which will be presented at Parliament House, Sydney, on Monday 25 September.

Quite a feather in the cap!

POWER OF ENGINEERING EXCURSION - by Lachlan Wall

On the 31st of July Mr Kempton, myself and all of my engineering-minded peers set off for the 'Power of Engineering' excursion in Lithgow. After the small bus trip to Lithgow, we were ready to enhance our knowledge and understanding of what an engineering career could hold for us. We were invited into a hall full of students and teachers from other schools, and engineers from a wide variety of backgrounds. After a short introduction explaining/outlining the day ahead, the Mudgee High School students were directed to the library where we were met with our first workshop.

Our first workshop was chaired by two engineers from the energy industry. This workshop had each group of six students trading electricity and trying to make the most profit. It was a great way to look at the world of buying and selling electricity. Though it was a very simplified version of what happens in real life, it was still an elegant display of jobs in the energy field.

The second workshop was a computer based workshop focused on bits and binary, and taught us how to count in binary. The two people leading the workshop had backgrounds in Mechatronics (robotics engineering) and civil engineering. They taught us to count in binary using numbers on our fingers. This will definitely be useful in the future and it gave us a small taste of engineering in the computing and software sector.

Our last workshop was aimed at chemical engineering. In this workshop, we undertook three different experiments which were i) colour changing slime, ii) exploding lunch bags and iii) elephant toothpaste. All of these experiments were fun and taught us how and why we saw the reactions that we did. Simply by adding or tweaking a ratio we saw radical changes in viscosity, size and energy. This was a great workshop giving us a taste of the field of chemical engineering.

We then headed back to the main hall for a question and answer session. During the session, all of the engineers talked about how great they thought the engineering field was for job opportunities, growth and availability. They talked very highly of all the engineering fields and about just why it is such a great career option. I was surprised to hear that all of the engineers thought that mathematics was not as important as the engineering stereotype would have us believe. After our burning questions were answered, MHS set off to our next location; the Mt Piper Power Station.

Most of us had already been to Mt Piper previously, however, it was just as great and informative as the first time that we went. During our tour, we saw all of the major sections of the plant when we walked past the mills, turbines, control centre, condenser and much more. During the near blizzard conditions, we also scaled the main buildings exterior and overlooked the cooling towers and the rest of the facility. Mt Piper gave us some great lessons and was a fabulous experience.

All of my peers and I had a great time and took a lot of ideas out of the excursion. It allowed us to better understand what a career in engineering could be like and whether or not it is a career to pursue. It also clarified the subject choices needed to secure a university course in engineering. This was a great excursions that gave us a valuable insight into several engineering fields and the basis upon which to consider engineering as a career.

Mudgee Host Family Respite service moves to Lifeskills Plus.


