PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Register

My paternal grandmother, who passed away almost twenty-eight years ago, had a saying: If you can't say anything nice, don't say anything at all.

I've been reminded of this saying of hers more than a couple of times in recent days.

At last week's assembly, I spoke to the gathered students about register as it applies to the ways in which each of us speaks.

Diction determined by circumstance has a name: register.

Register varies dependent upon the peculiarities of the circumstances in which we find ourselves.

The way in which we speak to the parish priest versus the way in which we may speak to mates will almost certainly generate a change in register.

The language of the front bar at the local pub will almost certainly present a different register to that of the wedding ceremony, Christening or funeral.

The language of the penitent – "Sorry officer, I didn't realise I was speeding" – versus the language of the recalcitrant – "You're just a revenue-source for the state... why don't you go catch some real criminals!" – makes use of two distinct registers, the latter possibly earning a bigger sting to the hip pocket nerve!

Students were reminded that we all possess these ranges of register. They were also reminded that most of us know where particular registers are appropriate and critically, where some are highly inappropriate.

They were also reminded that those gutteral, plosive, monosyllabic utterings that make verbally clear pain or distress or frustration – most of them Germanic in origin, an indication of their enduring attraction to a great many – that we call swear words have little place in what I will call school register.

Sadly, over the long weekend a photo and brief article about a new jacket design endorsed by the school's P&C attracted a punter or two in possession of such a register. Worse, these same punters had no qualms about using that register on our Facebook page. I get that social media can tease out the worst in some, but seriously... a school page?

Anyway, the comments were removed and thankfully did not reappear, so that's a kind of plus. That and the fact that they were **not** made by current students.

When our kids go away on excursions, the school is often contacted by those with whom they have come into contact desirous to tell us about how impressed they have been with the manners and behaviour of our students. The same is true by and large when we have visitors to the school. Unfortunately, on occasion I have had visitors to the school express their displeasure after they have found themselves within listening range of a student or two seemingly oblivious to what constitutes school register.

Being neither deaf nor stupid, I've not been in a position to do anything but agree. We do have some students who struggle with appropriate register. The fact that I have had to make apology for **all** of them because of a small **some** of them was also conveyed to students last Wednesday.

Those visitors so offended have been assured, just as the students were last Wednesday and are individually when necessary, that the staff of Mudgee High does not accept swearing at school and that swearing leads to sanctions. An inability or unwillingness to embrace what constitutes reasonable school register can even lead to suspension – the withdrawal of a student's right to an education.

I also pointed out to the kids that just as we do not condone swearing at school, we do not teach it either.

Those who swear at school, seemingly oblivious to the very real existence of what constitutes appropriate register in an educational environment, come fully stocked with swear words long before they start high school.

So with that last point in mind, I look forward to your continued assistance in making it unambiguous with those in our collective care, those over whom you have the greatest sway, your own kids, the importance of register; knowing the time and the place and what constitutes appropriate is an excellent preparation for later life.

THIS WAY UP was jointly designed and developed by Professor Gavin Andrews and his team of psychiatrists and clinical psychologists at St Vincent's Hospital, Sydney. As a non-profit initiative, THIS WAY UP is sponsored by the Australian Government and <u>the Clinical Research Unit for Anxiety and Depression (CRUfAD)</u> at St Vincent's Hospital, Sydney.

This Way Up offer a free online 'Coping with Stress Course'. The self-paced free course utilises a Cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT) approach for stress management. This course involves learning how to reduce your demands and increase your resources to help you manage the stressors in your life. A large emphasis is placed on active coping. This is all about doing something to change your situation, get extra help, or support yourself through the difficult time.

The course is free and is for people who are experiencing acute or chronic stress related to life demands, such as work, study, relationships, or caring for a family member. The course is self paced, but is designed to be completed within 2 months, at most. Lessons become available automatically 5 days after you complete the previous one. They recommend completing one lesson every week. The lessons are in a comic-based format, where you can follow the journey of a character as they learn practical skills to cope with their stress. They also learn how to maintain these skills, manage and reduce difficulties, and prevent symptoms from returning.

Dear Parents / Guardians,

As part of your child's Year 8 History studies of the topics "Investigating the Ancient Past" and "Contact and Colonisation," the HSIE faculty has arranged for a presenter to visit the school.

The Aboriginal Survival Technology presentation combines the sciences of anthropology, archaeology and ethnobiology. The presentation is delivered by researcher and science educator Philip Green. This presentation does not look at Dreaming traditions, spirituality or modern socio-political issues. The presentation focuses on the science of 8 technologies from pre-European contact, including clothing, hunting, medicine, bush tucker, fighting weapons, utensils and tools, water and fire.

The show combines live and interactive audio-visual demonstrations of artefacts. Students will be able to handle culturally appropriate artefacts. These artefacts are models; no sacred or taboo artefacts are used. No information presented is secret knowledge or specific to one Aboriginal group. It is generic and readily available in museums, books, DVDs and the internet.

This presentation will be partially subsidised to ensure all students in Year 8 can attend; however, we ask that your child bring a gold coin donation on the day to go towards the cost of the event.

All Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from all school years are welcome to attend the presentation if they wish. Students who are not in Year 8 will need to give their name to Miss Windeyer on the day so that attendance can be accounted for in our school rolls.
