Principal's Message

Addiction

Remember when a breakdown on the highway required a long trek or maybe a flagged hitch to the nearest payphone so as to summon the cavalry... which often came in a navy blue and white van that featured the letters NRMA?

Remember when you told your parents when you expected to be home and worked hard to meet that deadline because there was no way of letting them know that circumstances had changed, and you could cheerfully live without the grief tardiness always attracted?

Remember when "like" was more often than not a transitive verb that demonstrated attraction to someone, or the pleasure to be had from something? Or when to engage in twitter was the sole preserve of birds? Or when Instagram wasn't a thing at all?

... and then came the mobile phone.

Smartphones – now there's an oxymoron – are great little tools, much like knives, axes and chainsaws. In trained hands, all of these things are brilliant devices for accomplishing very specific tasks.

But like knives, axes and chainsaws, smartphones can be dangerous in the wrong hands.

In 2018, Chamath Palihapitiya, former Vice President of *User Growth* at Facebook, admitted to an audience of Stanford University students that he felt "tremendous guilt." This was in a response to a question about his involvement in exploiting consumer behaviour.

He said, "The short-term, dopamine-driven feedback loops that we have created are destroying how society works."

His admission in simple terms was this: smartphones turn people into genuine addicts.

Scoff at this claim and you may be in some serious peril.

Smartphones access social media* platforms and influence the very same neural circuitry used by poker machines and cocaine to keep users using... and using as much as possible. Seriously, you should really consider the science.

If you've ever misplaced your smartphone, you may have experienced a mild state of panic until you have found the thing. In surveys, three quarters of smartphone owners claim to have experienced this special kind of anxiety. When you consider that on average people spend between two and four hours per day tapping and swiping on their devices, touching them devotedly approximately 2,600 times in any twenty-four hour period, you begin to realise that we are talking about some serious digital addiction. And like the amputee who reports feeling an itch in a no longer existent foot, some feel their phone's siren-call vibration from deep within a pocket... where there is no phone.

At Mudgee High, we have toyed with a number of device policies since the popularity of smartphones went exponential some 10+ years ago. We began with a blanket ban that became a bane to administer. In more recent times, we have moved to a policy

where devices can be used in breaks but are not to be seen in class time. Many have complied. Sadly, many have not. The addictive allure is often just too great; students slip it out to check the time in rooms where there is a clock... to check a profile... to buy into an argument... to get another hit.

Dopamine, that chemical produced by our brains that plays an Academy Award winning role in motivating behaviour, is a mighty tempter. The neuroscience that explains addiction suggests that moderation is all but useless. Abstinence is what is needed. But with abstinence in a school setting, enforcement becomes the issue.

At next Monday night's P&C meeting, a system that enforces abstinence will be on display.

That system is called Yondr.

Yondr is a magnetic pouch system. It requires students place their phone in a pouch upon entering school, sealing it away for the day. The pouches can be reopened again when leaving school. That means 6 hours and twenty-five minutes without smartphone access. Seems reasonable... like giving up cigarettes or for some, cutting off your right arm for others.



Walanga Muru's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Entry Pathway (ATSIEP)

An opportunity for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander students to gain entry to study an undergraduate level course at Macquarie University.

In 2019 they are hosting interviews in the 2nd week of each month from NOW to January 2020.

Walanga Muru's ATSIEP is a 2-stage process, comprising of an online application and an interview. Interviews will be held on campus to give students the opportunity to elaborate on their application in a casual setting and hopefully gain entry into any undergraduate degree here at Macquarie University in 2020 prior to the main round offers.

The on-campus interview days also gives students the chance to meet with other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students currently studying at Macquarie University, learn more about our centre and the University campus, the events they run, and find out about any scholarships and accommodation options, and sporting opportunities etc. that you may be eligible for.

Each student that completes an online application (check out the link below for more info on the application) will be notified within 3 days of submitting an application whether their application is ready for an interview.

From the students interview date they will know within 2 weeks from the day they attend their interview whether they have been successful.

There are no prerequisites and students can apply if they:

- Would just like the peace of mind of an early offer.
- Are not going to receive an ATAR.
- Think that they may receive an ATAR score lower than is required for admission to their chosen degree.

Anti Bullying Alliance update


Powerful conversations on bullying

In Term 4, Mudgee High School's Anti-Bullying Alliance will provide information and resources developed specifically to trigger opportunities for casual and structured conversations on positive behaviours and actions. These resources will be presented in 4 sections: Prevention, Action, Resilience and Staying Safe Online. This week's newsletter begins with **Prevention: One Good Friend**.



The resource sections of the weekly conversations have been matched with thought-provoking questions to generate powerful conversations with students, staff and families to prevent, where possible, and address, where necessary, student bullying behaviours and building personal resilience – so as to support a whole school approach. There are also links to further resources and information on the NSW Anti-bullying website.

Week 1: Prevention - One good friend



Healthy friendships are important. A few solid friendships help your child feel connected to their world and have a positive impact on health and well-being. Friendships are crucial when it comes to bullying prevention. Here are the top seven characteristics to look for in a strong, connected and respectful friendship:

- Treat each other as equals.
- Be honest and trustworthy.
- · Celebrate one another's success.
- Stand up for each other.
- Support other friendships.
- · Be real and authentic.
- Do not engage in peer pressure.

Mudgee High is an aerosol-free zone

Due to the risk of severe allergic reaction, serious asthma attack or migraine in sensitive individuals, the use of aerosol deodorants or perfumes is banned at Mudgee High.

Students are requested not to bring aerosols to school, excursions or sporting events. Aerosol deodorant should be applied at home. Roll-on or pump spray deodorant may be brought to school for "top-up" applications if necessary.

Aerosol sprays brought to school will be confiscated and may be collected by parents/carers.



Cyber Safety



What is Kik Messenger?

Kik Messenger (Kik) is a free smartphone messenger application that allows users to send texts, pictures, videos and sketches. Kik uses a wireless connection or mobile data to send and receive messages.

What is the age restriction for Kik?

The age classification for Kik is 13-years-old, however young people between 13-17 years need to obtain parental permission before using Kik. If your child is using Kik and they are under 13, you can submit a deactivation request to have the account closed through the Kik website. This should occur in conjunction with an open discussion with your child about why this action is being taken. It is important to know that these age classifications are set by the apps

What are the potential problems with Kik?

creator and are not overseen by an independent body.

Kik is a popular application amongst young people of all ages. Issues arise when this app is used to transmit messages that are menacing, harassing or offensive. In some cases this can see young people in breach of State and Commonwealth legislation. Ethically, young people need to be aware that the messages they send can have a significant impact on other people.

As Kik also has the capability for users to share images, it is important that your child is aware of the legal and ethical ramifications of sharing sexualised, provocative and nude images.

It is extremely important that parents and carers are aware of the issues associated with various apps and websites so they can openly communicate with their child about their safe and responsible usage of Kik.

How can I limit who can contact my child on Kik?

There is a feature on Kik called 'New Chats' which separates messages sent to your child by random users, from people in their contacts list.

It's a good idea for your child to disable notifications from this feature before they start using Kik to prevent them from communicating with people they don't know. To do so, select Settings > Notifications and turn off Notify for New People. This will hide any messages sent to your child from people who aren't on their contact list.

How can I block someone on my child's Kik account?

It is really important that children know how to block and report on every social networking site or app that they might use. To block a user in Kik select Settings > Privacy > Block List, click the + to select the username of the person you want to block and select Yes or Block to confirm. This will make sure that all messages from this user will be hidden.

Note: A user will not be notified when they have been blocked.

How can my child delete a user on Kik?

We recommend that you monitor your child's use of Kik and be aware of who they are communicating with. This might mean going through your child's contact list together to identify who they are talking to. It is important to ensure that their contacts are people whom your child has met in real life, trust and are safe to communicate with on a regular basis.

To delete a contact on Kik, select the Talk icon to see their contacts. Select the person you wish to delete, swipe or press and hold and select Delete or Remove From List.

How do I delete my child's Kik account?

After talking with your child about the ethical use of Kik and your family's rules around technology, you may think it's appropriate to delete the Kik account.

To delete a Kik account you require your child's username and password. To delete the account select Settings > Your Account > Reset Kik Messenger. You then need to delete the Kik application from your child's device. Ask a friend with Kik to send a message to your child's old account and within a few days your child will receive an email (sent to the email address used to sign up for the account) from Kik saying you have











unread messages. At the bottom of this email will be a deactivation link – click on this and shortly after your account will be deleted.

Note: If your child logs into their Kik account before you have clicked on the deactivation link the request will be cancelled and the account will remain active.

Open and supportive discussions around technology usage are vital in ensuring your child understands their responsibilities when using technology. Simply removing the technology is not the best response as your child may then hide their use, making it more difficult for you to support them.

School Travel Applications



Applications for student travel in 2020 opened on Friday, 11 October 2019.

Students progressing to year 3 and year 7 no longer need to re-apply if they:

- Are continuing at the same school.
- Are residing at the same address.
- Have *not* been sent an expiry notification from Transport for NSW.

Where a student meets the new distance eligibility, the system will automatically update their entitlement. If they do not meet the new eligibility, they will receive an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

If students need to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to:

https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails

Applications need to be submitted before 31 December 2019 to ensure student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card is not cancelled. If their application is submitted after 31 December 2019, the system will automatically cancel an entitlement/card and a new one will need to be issued.

Students in the Opal network applying for a SSTS or Term Bus Pass entitlement for the first time will receive their card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2020.

Students residing in Rural and Regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the commencement of the new school year from their nominated operator, this may be distributed via the school or sent direct to their address. **Note**: Some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/Parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.
