Principal's Message

Handwriting

A revelatory piece of research from the other side of the world was released last week. It confirmed what many of us in education have reasonably suspected for years.

Writing by hand improves an individual's capacity to learn.

The newly published research, which comes from Norway, appeared on the World Economic Forum website, and it could not come at a more opportune time.

There is at present a NSW government push to improve reading in all state schools; reading that is more often than not assessed through, you have probably guessed it, written responses.

This push comes on the back of an independent review of National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN), conducted by Victoria, NSW, Queensland and the ACT. That review found that in the period between 2008 and 2019, writing performance among students has plateaued between Years 3 and 5. Worse, in that 12 year period, writing has demonstrated a marked decline between Years 7 and 9.

As an aside, while it may be correlation rather than causation, it is worth noting that in that same time period there has been a marked uptake of mobile devices by young people. Just saying.

The Norwegian study dovetails nicely with work that has been previously undertaken in this area by researchers at Western Australia's Murdoch University. That institution's long-term study looked into how fast and easily pre-school to Year 1 children can write. What they found was substantial evidence linking students who write with pen and paper being producers of better learning outcomes later on in their academic lives.

The Norwegian University of Science and Technology's researcher is a neuroscientist, Professor Audrye van der Meer. She says of handwriting that it provides, "more 'hooks' to hang your memories on."

She added, "A lot of senses are activated by pressing the pen on

paper, seeing the letters you write and hearing the sound you make while writing." In her paper, Professor van der Meer then goes on to explain that the experience of hand writing creates contact between different parts of the brain, opening it up for learning.

The study shows that handwriting stimulates both learning and memory. Handwriting shakes into action the neural pathways that fire an individual's capacity to remember.

The same research also reveals that drawing by hand has a similar effect on learning and memory.

The findings suggest strongly that the movement and cognitive effort required by both activities – writing and drawing, as opposed to keystrokes on a keyboard or thumb swipes across a screen – better enable the brain to encode new information.

The word is out. Encouraging the kids in our collective care to take up the pen over the keyboard pays better dividends.

By the way, the irony isn't lost on me that weekly I put together my part of the school newsletter using a keyboard.

That's the reason I've chosen to finish this part of my spiel using my favourite kind of digital technology; the humble pen. I'm feeling more creative already!

End of Year Presentation

NSW appears to have turned a pandemic corner. A good thing. That said, restrictions are still in place. The school is obliged to provide 4sqm per adult on site.

Photography competition

Students at Mudgee High were invited to celebrate the Spring Equinox this year with a photo competition.

In Australia, calendar Spring starts on 1 September. Astronomically speaking, it doesn't start until 22 September thanks to an event called the Vernal Equinox. Equinox occurs when the Sun is directly above the Earth's equator at noon causing day and night hours to be of approximately equal length.

At Equinox, the tilt of the Earth's axis is neither towards nor away from the Sun. This happens twice a year, in March and again in September. After Spring or Vernal Equinox, the axis of the Earth begins to tilt the Southern Hemisphere closer to the Sun, bringing us toward Summer.

Along with the gorgeous scent of flowers buzzing with bees, Spring is a great time to get out and see the stars at night. To celebrate Spring, Mudgee High's Science Department held a photography competition. The competition ran for 3 weeks from 1 September and was open to all students.

In recognition for outstanding skill in capturing Spring with a camera, the winning photo prize of a \$50 gift voucher was awarded to Gemma Ryan of Year 10 for her entry called *Coming out of hibernation*. The competition was so close, that a second place prize of a \$20 gift voucher was awarded to Charlie Johanson from Year 7 for his entry titled *Living with giants*.

Holocaust Talks

On 10 November, students at Mudgee High participated in a talk titled 'Understanding the Holocaust', presented by the Sydney Jewish Museum. The interactive session was designed to help students understand the importance of studying the Holocaust. The program also introduced students to significant factors that can help them understand how this cataclysmic event unfolded.

The seminar examined:

- How Nazi ideology operated as a driving force behind the decision to destroy European Jewry.
- Key historical events that culminated in the mass shootings of Jews and the subsequent establishment of extermination camps.
- An explanation of how the persecution and murder of Jews was central to the aim of the Nazi regime to establish an empire in Europe.



On 13 November, students were given the chance to talk to Tomas Fleischmann.

Tomas Fleischmann was born in what is now Slovakia on 27 June 1938. Tomas is one of only 123 survivors of 16,000 children who went through Terezin Concentration Camp during WWII. He and his pregnant mother Lolli were arrested, sent to Szered Camp, transported to Auschwitz and interred at Terezin where Lolli gave birth to another son, Peter. After the war, Tomas migrated to Australia.

Two students commented:

SM - The session was very mind-opening. It is very important to get a first person perspective. In particular, when studying the Holocaust, it was nice to have a positive story interwoven with the tragedy.

EB - It provided a human outlook on the Holocaust, rather than the numbers aspect that is taught when studying the Holocaust. It grabbed your attention with the way he spoke about his experiences, and how close he came to death.


