Principal's Message

Taking the cash

All NSW state school teachers are required to complete a range of training at regular, set times. That training comes in many shapes.

There is face-to-face CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and anaphylaxis awareness training every year. There is annual training in the demands of child protection, the code of conduct, disability standards, and a host of other matters, fields and themes that form part of the rich tapestry that is teaching.

To remain teachers, this compliance training must be completed successfully as mandated.

One such type of training, disability awareness training, ensures that teachers are cognisant of and compliant with the demands of the Federal Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and the Disability Standards for Education Act (2005).

Compliance with these acts seeks to ensure that all students participate and thrive in an education setting that values and supports them as learners on the same basis as their peers.

NSW state teachers comply with these obligations by providing classrooms environments in which students learn to form positive and respectful relationships with a diverse range of people – diversity being a key strength of public education. State school teachers seek to differentiate the instruction they deliver by targeting each student's learning needs. They work to present alternative delivery modes and activities that provide comparable learning experiences for all in their care. State school teachers have high expectations for all of the young people in their care, and seek to personalise goals for their students based on data and evidence.

Public education seeks to provide for everyone who chooses to come through that school gate, and ensure that each and every one of those students is known, valued and cared for. It is the great leveller and the one true bulwark against a decent into religious, class or ethnic tribalism; in short, it is a powerful force for cohesion.

A Year Adviser reported this week that she had been contacted by a private school* seeking information about one of our students related specifically to whether that student's behaviour and application had improved. The student's parents were seeking enrolment for their child

at that school.

If a state school were to exercise the same kind of enrolment restrictions, its leadership would be compelled to answer some serious questions about how such restrictions shape up when considered against the DDA.

And rightly so.

The message from our 'private' contemporaries would seem loud and clear: "We only take them if they're not broken."

Not bad when one considers the largess of the state in funding these institutions. In September this year, the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) released a report - *Education at a Glance* – that ranked Australia 19 out of the 37 wealthiest countries when it comes to the fair funding of schools. In fact, Australia ranked the third highest of those 37 countries when it comes to government funding of what is private choice.

*It is a proper stretch of the word 'private' to refer to schools that source so much of their funding from public coffers as being in any way genuinely private. As substantially publically funded institutions, perhaps they should be called upon to shoulder at least a portion of the load when it comes to taking care of some of the most vulnerable in our midst.

Just some thoughts.


