The young people we interview seldom fail to provide a glimpse of what promises a bright future for this nation.

In Term 4, invitations will go out and interviews will be conducted to select medallists from the ranks of Year 7 to 11.

Singing one's praises is not a quality associated with Australian cultural norms, but I would encourage you to encourage the young people in your care to make application if they demonstrate:

- Involvement in a significant and positive manner across a range of school activities.
- · Commitment to academic studies.
- Regular attendance and adherence to the school's universals of being safe, respectful and responsible.

Year 12 students who hit all of these marks are encouraged to make application for a Principal's Gold Medal.



Informative Writing Task 2: Procedural Writing

Imagine you are the head chef at a gourmet pizza restaurant. Your restaurant is famous for making the best pizza in the world. You need to explain the procedure for making this delicious dish to your up-and-coming apprentice chef.

Write a recipe for the best pizza in the world. Your recipe will need to be detailed, clear and follow a logic order. Your recipe should be able to be used by an amateur cook to make an exact recreation for your pizza.

Your apprentice has never made this dish before, so you will need to be very precise in your instructions. Think about: what ingredients will you need? What equipment is necessary? What are the specific steps of this process?

Remember to use:

- · Clear and logical instructions
- Verbs which describe specific actions
- · Adverbs to show how an action should be performed.

MHS Link Program 2021

The Link Program is an alternative educational program for students in Year 10. The program caters for up to 25 students who may experience difficulty in engaging with the traditional delivery of school curriculum. The program is flexible, practical, stimulating and relevant, and promotes pathway options into Years 11 and 12 at Mudgee High School; TAFE; an apprenticeship/traineeship; or traditional employment.

The program was established in 2012 and involves a number of partners including Mudgee High School, TAFE and Mid-Western Regional Council. The program is fully funded and supported by Glencore Coal. The program was recently a finalist for a Community Excellence Award at the NSW Minerals Council Environment and Community conference and awards.

Link students experience a wide curriculum including attendance at Mudgee TAFE and work experience. Students receive literacy and numeracy support, and engage in personal skills development programs. The program has a teaching staff co-ordinator and a community mentor. These two support participating students so as to enhance their prospects for success in the program as well as their future transition into further education, training and/or employment.

The primary outcomes of the Link program are:

- To re-engage students in school activities.
- To provide pathways for transition into further study or work.
- To build self-esteem and the confidence to continue in training and education.
- To reduce social isolation issues and incorporate school leavers into the community in a positive manner.
- To apply a multi-agency approach to a community based issue.

As part of the selection process for 2021, interested Year 9 students are required to submit an *Expression of Interest* form. This form can be collected from Mrs McNeill in the Creative Arts staffroom, Mr Payne in the Language/Careers Staffroom or Ms Carr in the Support Unit staffroom. Parents are also welcome to request an *Expression of Interest* by phoning or visiting the school. Guidelines for completion and closing date are included with the form.

All students and parents who anticipate that this program could be of benefit are encouraged to apply. For any student who may find completing an *Expression of Interest* a challenge, we encourage them to make contact with Mrs McNeill, Mr Payne (Community Mentor) or their Year Adviser at school to arrange assistance for completion.

Link Program 2021 - Expression of interest

The Link Program is well recognised in the community as an alternative learning program for up to 25 students in Year 10. The program aims to re-engage students in school activities and can involve study at TAFE and work experience placements. It also provides pathways for transition into further study or work, and works to build self-esteem and confidence to continue in training and education.

Since its establishment in 2012, the Link Program has seen the majority of its participants achieve outstanding outcomes. These have ranged from apprenticeships, traineeships, study at TAFE, paid work and completion of the HSC. As a result of this success, the list of nominated candidates has grown each year. Therefore, we believe the introduction of an 'Expression of Interest' is important for the continued development of the program, and to ensure a fair process for all students. In order to get the most from the program, we feel it is essential that students connect with their responsibility for making the most of the opportunities provided throughout their time in Link.

Students who wish to be considered for the 2021 Link Program are required to complete the attached EOI. All questions should be completed. Students are encouraged to seek assistance from Ms McNeill, Mr Payne or any member of staff if they are having difficulty completing the form.

This EOI must be returned to the Careers/Languages staffroom or the front office no later than 3:25pm, Friday 14 August.

ABA - What do students think?

Understanding how children and young people make sense of bullying within their peer and social groups is central to understanding their actions.

 Research has found that young people most commonly suggest the reason for bullying at school is enhancing social status within the peer group.



Social status and belonging to their peer group are increasingly important to most children and young people from the middle years of school into adolescence. In the process of forming a friendship group, bullying can be used to strengthen the group by excluding those who are not part of it.

A school's social environment can unintentionally create a rigid social hierarchy for students, which can lead to bullying. Students sometimes report that the student 'leadership' structures and roles actually promote bullying.

 Research into the views of students suggests that those who bully others may appear to be popular but are not always liked.

In addition, young people identify that bullying happens to some students more often because they are considered different, odd or unusual in some way. Students also sometimes think that those who do the bullying have personal problems.

The main thing students will be doing in their lives in the 21st century is learning, and to do this successfully, they need to slow down enough to be in the moment to think hard about what they looking at. Google in some ways has taken the emphasis away from looking beyond first impressions; everything seems to be instant these days.

Teaching students to follow an intelligent research process enables them to slow down to think hard about each step they are doing. To support this process, you can ask them to describe how they are thinking using Habits of Mind. Also, using the brain pathway building structure of Thinking Tools, provides opportunities for them to analyse, evaluate and predict.

Adopting these approaches cultivates effective research habits which include knowing what to do when they don't know what to do, relating how what they learn connects to their world and identifying and finding the information they need to learn more about. Their organisation skills improve by planning time targets, analysing their findings and looking for bias, patterns, inference and implied messages and presenting what they learned with clarity and precision. Once they have mastered these, they can make predictions from their findings.
