Principal's Message

Inference

In looking at student results in our junior school, including their NAPLAN results, we know that an area where our kids do not always do well as they could is in the area of inference.

Inference is the capacity to deduce meaning from simply evidence and reasoning rather than from explicit statements made. Inference requires the conclusions the reader draws from a given written, visual or auditory text be substantiated by evidence from the text. Those conclusions the reader makes will be based upon what they sense as well as be drawn from their prior knowledge; their experience.



That experience can be gained through exposure to other texts... trustworthy sources. Wide reading and wide viewing breed familiarity with the broader world and an excellent cultural knowledge. The individual so imbued may even prove a major asset in a game of trivia!

One way to develop inferential thinking is to model "thinking aloud." Hearing thought processes vocalised – voicing how it is the process of inferential thinking is accomplished – can be powerful stuff.

It is the kind of activity that needs to be undertaken and undertaken again, because the ability to infer is one developed through practice.

Exposing your kids to alternate points of view, allowing them opportunities to work with a diverse range of texts (not just books... films, documentaries, websites, photographs, paintings... texts covers anything that has the capacity to convey meaning) will assist them to develop their inferential understanding and apply that skillset to other learning experiences.

Inference is about seeing the connections between disciplines; understanding that there is a potential for associations and correlations in all that they do... mathematics, English, the sciences, history, geography, the applied arts... all of it.

Inference is essential for any kind of deep understanding and higher-order analysis.

The ability to infer enables an individual to:

- Provide explanations for ideas that are present without being explicitly stated.
- Offer details or reasons for events that have occurred through the lens of personal knowledge and lived experience.
- Recognise an author's point of view or potential bias.
- Interpret the language choices, both technical and figurative, and demonstrate an understanding of how those choices can shape meaning.
- Offer judgements based on non-literal evidence presented in a text.

A test:

Text: "Rachael crossed her fingers behind her back as her mother left the house."

Background/ prior knowledge question: Why do people cross their fingers?

Crossing one's fingers can be a gesture of good luck. It can also be a physical expression of a desire that events will play out in preferred manner. Crossed fingers behind one's back, however, can indicate the telling of a lie or a wish that a deception not be discovered; the making of a promise that will not be kept.

With these things in mind, why has Rachael crossed her fingers behind her back?

The answer any of us now provides in this space will be the product of deduction based on what we have read and conjecture based on prior cultural knowledge. It will not be an absolute, but it will be well reasoned.

In short, the answer will be the product of inference.

What a great skill to have... and all it requires is a sound general knowledge and regular practice.

Aboriginal Studies - Tree Planting

As part of their coursework in Aboriginal Studies, some students participated in the planting of four Callistemon or Bottlebrush trees.

The subspecies was the Callistemon citrinus - Crimson Bottlebrush. This hardy shrub is probably the best known bottlebrush and is widely cultivated. The bright red flower spikes appear in summer and autumn. Crimson Bottlebrush grows well in wet conditions and

usually reaches 4 metres in height.

Year 12 Legal Studies

Throughout Term 4, Year 12 Legal Studies students have been attending weekly study lessons in the classroom. One key area for revision in Legal Studies is the Crime topic. This is a core topic in the syllabus, meaning that every student across NSW studies this topic. It is examined in the HSC examination through 15 multiple choice questions and an extended response worth 15 marks.

Juniors

If you are planning your supplies for your children for next year:

- All students in Years 7 to 10 need a dedicated A4 English book. Not one that is shared with multiple subjects.
- Students need at least 2 black pens, 2 blue pens, 2 red pens, their own rule, pencil sharpener, pencils, eraser and lead pencils.
- A bottle which can be filled with water for when they are thirsty.

Focal Areas

Next year sees the faculty focusing on reading strategies and how to improve students' comprehension skills. Our first tip comes from *Fix It Reading* (teachit by Annabel Wall):

Skim

To read or reread something quickly to get a general idea of what it is about.

Scan

To read or reread something to find a specific piece of information or detail.

Some tips

- You do not need to read every word when you skim and scan.
- Ignore the little words (like 'a', 'at', 'on', 'in', etc.).
- Read the first sentence of each paragraph. Look for important nouns and verbs
- Look for numbers and words with capital letters.
- Use signposts like headings and subheadings to help you gather key information quickly.
- Sometimes you might skim and scan at the same time for example, when you reread your writing to check spelling mistakes.

Transition

Over the next couple of weeks, our partner primary schools are bringing their Year 6 students in

to experience high school. So far, the English faculty have met two groups of students, all excited about the new premises. These are conducted in a COVID-safe manner. Miss Eslick and Mrs Willetts have been very complimentary about the two classes with which they have spent time. We hope to learn more about our future students and wish them enjoyable 'taster' lessons with us.



All NSW school-enrolled children are eligible for **two \$100 Active Kids vouchers** each year. After 1 July, the second voucher can be claimed immediately after the first voucher.
