#### **Graduating in style**


On Wednesday evening, the Class of 2021 graduated at a fine function held at Mudgee's Parklands Resort.

One of the more basic laws of economics is the law of supply and demand. It is a principle of economic theory. The willingness of

individuals to supply and other individuals to demand determines the market price and therefore market equilibrium; that place where the quantity of goods that people are prepared to supply meets the quantity that is on demand.

What happens when demand outstrips supply?

Enter AdBlue.

AdBlue is the trademark name of a urea-based diesel fuel additive that acts as an anti-pollutant in modern diesel engines. For a host of reasons, but chiefly because China is the largest supplier of AdBlue's necessary urea and that nation has tightened its grip on supply so as to keep a lid on costs within its own borders, it is in critically short supply.

Australia's trucking industry is diesel-powered.

Australia's rail freight network is diesel-powered.

Australian mining, agriculture and sea transport is all, by and large, diesel-powered.

When there is a reduction in supply but demand remains high, the law of supply and demand makes clear that prices – the price of AdBlue in this case – will rise until demand and supply are in equilibrium.

On Tuesday 7 December, teachers across New South Wales took industrial action. Wearing my "NSW Teachers' Federation member, union rep. in three schools, past association president and association life member" hat, I can tell you that that action had everything to do with the law of supply and demand.

Teachers in NSW have become a kind of educational AdBlue. Supply is growing ever scarcer yet demand has remained relentless.

This scarcity of supply demands a few questions. Why is supply so diminished? What can be done to increase supply, if the demand that schools be adequately staffed is to be met?

Still wearing that "Federation" hat, the solution seems manifestly simple; make teaching as an occupation more attractive. In doing so, more people – people with a great deal of promise, people who may make great teachers – may be attracted to the ranks. It will cost, but that is the law of supply and demand at work.

#### **English News**

The first topic that all English courses tackle is the Common Module, Texts and Human Experiences. In this module, students develop their understanding of how individual and collective human experiences are represented through their exploration of their set texts.

The Advanced class is currently studying the work of Australian poet, Kenneth Slessor. Students are examining how Slessor's poems represent human qualities, emotions, and universal themes such as despair, loss and the march of time associated with these experiences. They are exploring how texts may give insight into the anomalies, paradoxes and inconsistencies in human behaviour and motivations, inviting the responder to see the world differently, to challenge assumptions, and to ignite new ideas or reflect personally.


As a way to make connections between each of the six poems, students strung string between copies of the poems that had been put up around the classroom last week. They were required to not only link the poems thematically but also conceptually. Students also needed to bring their ideas back to the rubric, which is the foundation of the module.

For a double period, the students had fun with the ribbon and were very successful in making a physical representation of the connections. Once they had finished taping the ribbon to the poems, they then sat down amongst it all and wrote down what they saw.

The photos show but a snapshot of what they were able to put together during this activity. A great learning experience.









#### **Library News**

As Term 4 wanes and the Christmas break looms, the library has been busy preparing for the start of the 2022 academic year.

Year 10 students studying HSC subjects via Distance Education (DE) over the next two years have or are currently finalising their enrolment through the Library. Our current senior DE students have moved into their HSC course study and have undertaken their first assessment tasks in a range of subjects for their various 'virtual' schools.

Our Aurora College students of 2021 have also been finalising their year across both Year 7 and 8 subjects in Maths, English and Science with some outstanding results achieved by this small but highly motivated cohort.

Year 11 students who have been studying for their drone pilot licence all year through UAVAIR finished their final assessments this week. Dependent upon these results, Mudgee now has potentially another six qualified, commercial drone pilots to offer employers.

Our Community Room, which is used for senior study, examinations, visiting guests and staff booked events, has undergone a furniture refurbishment this term which bodes well for a highly utilised resource within the Library leading into 2022.

Return of all outstanding Library resources has been ongoing this week and all students have been requested to return all books on loan before their last day at school for 2021.

I am sure most of us will be happy to see the end of 2021. A difficult and at times bizarre year in many ways. Teaching, learning and school events and their delivery to our students here at Mudgee High were no exception. Like everyone else, our school Library adapted and changed to meet the need. Let's hope 2022 provides our school community with a year we can concentrate on face-to-face

learning engagement, free of external distraction.


