Don King

Don King will turn 90 this year... and he will do so quite a wealthy man.

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Who is Don King?

Don King is an African-American man who made his wealth as a fight promotor. He engineered some truly historic boxing matchups. His career highlights include promoting the "Rumble in the Jungle", the 1974 fight between the undefeated world heavyweight champion George Foreman, and the challenger Muhammad Ali, the former heavyweight champion. The fight was held in Kinshasa, Zaire. Ali won by a knockout, putting Foreman down just before the end of the eighth round. He did so before an audience of 60,000 and a television audience considerably larger.

King was also behind the "Thrilla in Manila". This was a matchup between Muhammad Ali and Joe Frazier, held at the Araneta Coliseum in the Philippines in 1975. Ali was again the victor, this time by technical knockout (TKO). The matchup's name came from Ali, who

had made the rhyming boast that the fight would be: "A killa and a thrilla and a chilla, when I get that gorilla in Manila."

King was not without controversy. In 1954, he shot a man in the back after spotting him trying to rob one of his gambling houses; this incident was ruled a justifiable homicide. Thirteen years later, he was convicted of manslaughter for stomping one of his employees to death. That behaviour earned him almost four years in prison.

The remarkable thing about King is that while he was at the heart of some of the biggest fights in history, he never threw a punch. He was a fight promotor, not a fighter.

Occasionally, we have our own Don Kings at work within the school. Students who are more than happy to operate as fight promotors, go-betweens when there is a whiff of discord in the air, conduits for spreading spite.

Outwardly, these students may present as "friends". They are not. They are catalysts for ugliness.

It is worth noting that in the wider community, fight promotion, as well as the filming of fights, is treated by the police and courts as little different to the behaviour of those who fight. In other words, promotors are treated like assailants.

Fight promotors at Mudgee High soon discover that school is no different.

Inclosed Lands Protection Act 1901

At each of the school's entrances there is signage advising that QR codes are in use for visitors – a response to COVID-19. There is also signage that advises that CCTV is employed at the school. Finally, there is signage reminding would-be visitors that school grounds are "inclosed" meaning that unless you have business on site, unauthorised entry may be treated as trespass. Be aware too that inclosed lands extends to sites to which the school may relocate, such as the Mudgee Olympic Pool for our Term 1 carnival event, or Walkers Oval for events like the Cross Country or the Athletics Carnival.

Limiting outside access to only those who have legitimate business with the school is all about keeping people and property safe.

Very occasionally, school principals may be required to serve a person or group of people an Inclosed Lands Protection Act 1901 letter. The letter will advise that person or group of people that unless they have explicit permission from the principal, that person or a group of people must not come on site.

Such letters are earned when a person or people demonstrate behaviours that have no place on a school site; behaviours that have the potential to harm others. It is worth noting that the expectations outlined in such a letter are enforceable by the police.

I can count on one hand the number of times I have had to serve such a letter. The recipients have always been either parents or carers.

I have never enjoyed serving such letters and certainly do not do so lightly.

The safety of people on site and the duty of care they are owed has, however, occasionally made the serving of such letters unavoidable.



Library News

There has been plenty written about attaining educational success. Indeed, a whole industry has been spawned analysing and promoting what works and what leads to better academic and educational outcomes for young people. This research and the subsequent findings (that is ongoing and cycles through the field of education) has been used to inform and support parents, teachers and school systems in bringing about enhanced educational outcomes for students. Two fundamentals given are; 'academic success seems heightened in those who are read to very early (0 - 4 years) and continue to read' and lots of education is actually attained 'beyond the school gate.'

History lesson aside, this is not a plug to get everyone reading books. It is, however, a plug for two digital platforms Mudgee High has invested in; platforms that provide the opportunity to learn 'beyond the school gate'. They are ClickView and Britannica Online.

If your child has an interest (dare an obsession) in a topic, whether it be an historical event or something more recent, a person, sport, civilisation or social phenomenon, ClickView and/or Britannica have it covered. If they need to build a model of something, explain a theory, argue a thesis, complete a research assessment task or differentiate 'fake news' (propaganda, clickbait, marketing) from reality... ClickView and/or Britannica have it covered and cater to differing styles of learners and learning.

ClickView is a visual library platform. An online repository storing hundreds of thousands of films and television programs, arranged in subject areas and with our own dedicated Mudgee High library server. If a subject has been studied at school (or watched) it will be on ClickView. If a film, documentary, news or current affairs segment, television series or exposé has a link to education (as deemed by any teacher on the system or identified by the ClickView team itself) and it has appeared on any television network nationally, ClickView probably has it. ClickView also supplies its own educational programs through the platform. Programs can be searched by subject, interest or title.

Britannica Online works like a search engine for finding information and provides that information as text, videos and images. It also allows students to choose between three different levels (Primary, Middle and High), that will cater to just about any academic need and ability. It is much more than just an encyclopaedia but has its origins and takes its reputation from one of the most reputable encyclopaedias in the world.


Both support learning well beyond the school gate and can be accessed at home on any device that connects to an internet browser.



Thursday 29 April: Meat Science / Environmental and Rural Science

- Meat Science: Students will watch a butcher turn a beef carcass into food, discuss what muscles are the most tender and which ones are the toughest and why, how to ensure food is safe to eat and finally make and cook our own burgers for lunch!
- Environmental and Rural Science: Students will be taken on an informative tour of the Centre for Animal Research and Teaching. They will see where the sheep, cattle and poultry are housed.

Wednesday 12 May: Theatre Studies


