Principal's Message

Knowing stuff and critical thinking

Welcome to Education Week 2021!

What a perfect week in which to consider the power of critical thinking.

While aware that self-praise is often no-praise, I will begin with this: I am confident that if I were drafted into a trivia team, I would almost certainly give a reasonable account of myself... unless the questions were all sport related (my Achilles' heel).

I know when the great depression began; when the last US forces left Vietnam; the names of all of Australia's Prime Ministers since the end of the Second World War, including the recycled ones; the names of the five capital cities that start with 'M' that have hosted the Olympic Games since 1945; the simple fact that the blue whale is the largest vertebrate to have ever existed, and; the fact that the tomato is technically a fruit and not a vegetable.

I know that I know stuff.

I also know that these days, if I do not know something, finding out that something has never been easier.

Thanks, internet!

The acquisition of information has never been easier. It's everywhere. What is in short supply is critical thinking.

Critical thinking – the intellectually disciplined process of actively and skilfully conceptualising, applying, analysing, synthesising, and evaluating information gathered from, or generated by, observation, experience, reflection, reasoning, or communication, then using what has been gleaned as a guide to belief and action – is some seriously intellectual stuff and not nearly common enough.

In its ideal form, critical thinking is based on universal intellectual values that transcend subject matter divisions. A well-versed critical thinker can see the connections between mathematics and the humanities, the sciences and the arts.

A critical thinker possesses to some degree clarity of thought, precision in expression, a sense of relevance, an ability to be pragmatic - the ability to change direction when change is needed – and a well-developed sense of what is reasonable and fair.

It is a great time to be a critical thinker. The flood of information that has come as the result of the connectedness we now have also comes with a great deal of misinformation flotsam.

I read an article recently in *The New Daily* that put forward the idea that the more an individual believes in conspiracy theories – the earth is flat, man never went to the moon, COVID isn't real... that sort of thing – the worse they perform in critical thinking tests. This observation is based on clinical studies – the work of scientists.

These researchers went to great pains to make it clear that conspiracy theorists do not necessarily lack intelligence. What conspiracy theorists lack is the skill set to objectively analyse and evaluate a given situation.

Conspiracy theories are nothing new. The problem these days is that information has been fully democratised with the advent of social media. That sounds good; democracy is a good thing, right? What it means, however, is that any idiot with a keyboard can self-publish.

The piece quoted Anthony Lantian, an associate professor of psychology and a co-author of the new study, who went on to say:

"Conspiracy theories refer to attempts to explain the ultimate cause of an important event by accusing a hidden coalition of perceived malicious and powerful people or organisations of having secretly planned and implemented these events."

An example of this kind off uncritical thinking is the continuing conspiracy theory that shady figures in the US government were behind the events of 9/11. They were the ones who orchestrated the flying of passenger jets into the World Trade Centre towers and the Pentagon, rather than the events that unfolded being simply the work of Islamic terrorists.

Another example is the one that holds that the COVID-19 pandemic was created **on purpose** by Chinese scientists, and then released. This idea should not be confused with the theory that the coronavirus accidentally escaped a lab in Wuhan where Chinese scientists **do** legitimately study pathogens to better understand them, just as scientists and researchers working for the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (CSIRO) do right here in Australia.

Can the maddening nuttiness of conspiracy theorists be curbed?

It transpires that curbing nuttiness relies a great deal on personality.

Ego and personality can predispose a person to resist changing the way they think. A series of experiments in 2016 established what has been described as a "robust association" between a need for uniqueness – an individual's need to feel special, to feed their ego – and a conspiracy mentality.

In other words, the desire to be seen as unique and special serves as a motivation for conspiracy theorising... and social media provides an outlet for the least informed.

It may be a case that, for some people, ego trumps everything else.

Consider the recently expelled Katie Hopkins, a lesser known "celebrity", flown in especially for a braincell-destroying spectacle called *Celebrity Big Brother*.

Hopkins rise to fame, in the UK at least, kicked off with an appearance on *The Apprentice*. She then became a columnist for the conservative British publications *The Sun* and *The Daily Mail*. In her home country, she is probably best known for her Islamophobic and classist views, her antifeminism, her Holocaust-denying and her anti-immigration views. Here she is best known for her nuttiness and an absence of wardrobe.

Hopkins came to Australia (whose idea was that?). Once here, she openly defied COVID-inspired Health Order restrictions and made a point of self-incrimination by posting her stupid to social media, earning herself a flight straight back to the UK. Expelled from the *Big Brother* house before she had made it through the door!

This kind of self-destructive behaviour speaks volumes about the power of ego and a dogged determination to resist reality and indeed social responsibility.

"What was she thinking?" Maybe she wasn't thinking at all.


Critical thinking – the ability and willingness to consider a variety of sources, their relative reliability, to see things from other perspectives, to be open to the new but not blindly accepting of that same new – is a powerful thing. Something to be embraced.

Knowing a tomato is a fruit is knowledge. Knowing to **not** put it in a fruit salad based on observation, experience, and communication with others knowledgeable in the crafting of edible fruit salads... that's critical thinking manifest.

This week is indeed officially Education Week, but then every week should be an educational one. If you are not learning new things every day, you may be comatose... or worse.

Library News

Term 3 is the start of a very busy season within the Library. Senior assessment in our Distance Education cohort is at full pace with both Trial and HSC examinations in 'Speaking' scheduled in Week 3 and Week 9 of term. Written Trial HSC examinations through our various distance

education schools will also occur during Weeks 5 and 6. In Weeks 9 and 10, Year 11 will undertake their Preliminary course final examinations before 2022 HSC courses commence in Term 4. Please be mindful that Distance Education timeframes for senior examinations do not necessarily correspond with those set by Mudgee High for its students.

Our three Aurora students are 'deep' into their assessment period across all subjects and are making excellent progress via remote learning. Ironically, in our 'Aurora Bunker' within the Library, remote learning was always a 'thing' prior to 'Covid times'. Online lessons, virtual classrooms of talking heads and interactive programs where Mathematics problems and brain storming ideas are jotted down and shared in real time, are everyday occurrences.

Max Potential students in Year 10 continue to meet with their mentors this term. Weekly meetings between students enrolled in the program and community leaders across industries carry over from last term. Working towards personal projects that develop student skills and focus on community outcomes is a 'win, win' for all involved and the Library has been more than happy to accommodate the Max Potential initiative for several years.

The six senior students enrolled in the UAVAIR drone course are still progressing towards achieving their commercial drone pilot licences. Utilising a combination of both online and face to face tuition, the course will continue in the Library. Practical drone flying days have also been underway during the year to date and these have occurred regularly on our school oval.

At present, the Library is also hosting a display of 'Homemade Musical Instruments' made by Mr Holleman's Year 7 Music class. Some are highly imaginative and effective as 'music makers'. Others stretch the humble Milo tin to the limit of its musical potential!

Week 7 this term also marks Book Week 2021. The theme of Book Week this year is 'Old Worlds, New Worlds, Other Worlds'. The Library will be running a display amongst other things to celebrate this event, showcasing both 'iconic' and new literature that explores this year's theme.

For juniors, if the task is late without an extension, they lose 20% per day. Many are given time during class to complete their tasks and should be able to submit them on time.

Year 12 has recently completed their final assessment tasks and it was wonderful to see the improvement and high quality of their submissions. Their next hurdle will be the Trial examinations. We wish them the very best of luck for all these examinations and hope that they continue to improve their skills and knowledge of their courses.

Year 11 has just had the first assessment task returned. Many students did a wonderful job, but others needed to follow processes for being absent. We still have students who have not submitted the first task. This is very disappointing to note. If your child/ward is absent from school for an assessment task, then it is beneficial for you to contact the school (email or phone) to let the school know that they will be absent. When your child returns to school, they should then seek out Ms Date and request a pink special consideration form. They need to complete the form, so that they are not penalised for submitting their task late. The policy states they will receive 0 marks if late, so it is worthwhile to complete a request for special consideration when unforeseen events arise.

Years 9/10 Premier's Debating Challenge update

At the end of Term 2, the second round of the prestigious Premier's Debating Challenge saw Mudgee High debate a formidable team from Dubbo South College. With controversial topics about sport to choose from, Mudgee High won the coin toss and were affirmative on "That we should ban all sports involving animals." The winning combination of Daniel Pegg, Miriam Halbisch and Emilie Martin, assisted by their quick-thinking team adviser, Darcy Endacott, was victorious on the day. The team now faces Delroy College in the third round of the competition. These students have been excellent ambassadors for Mudgee High and are commended on their commitment to debating.




Book Week 21 – 27 August

Work may be handed in on paper. Please do not assume that everything has to be digital.



High Potential and Gifted News

Last term, the High Potential and Gifted Program students engaged in the Department of Education's Game Changer Challenge. This is a state-wide initiative that is entering its fourth year and is available to 2,200 plus public schools across New South Wales. The premise of this challenge is for students to engage in design thinking, which is a human-centred approach to solving complex problems. Empathy and collaboration are at the heart of design thinking.

Our students eagerly engaged in the challenges laid before them, tackling the question: 'Humans have unlimited needs but the planet has limited capacity to satisfy them'. Our five teams presented innovative solutions.

One of our team has successfully made it through to the quarter finals and is one of the top eight teams from our region. This is particularly impressive because our Year 7 and 8 teams are competing with students from Year 7 through to Year 12!!!

Our successful team comprises Cameron Etherington, Olivia Martin, Rachel Channon, Macy Dowler and Amy Ioane. Read their 300 word submission below:

"A gradual increase in the earth's temperatures has led to climate change. Humans see climate change as less rain, longer droughts and hotter summers. Carbon dioxide is a naturally occurring greenhouse gas.

One of the reasons for climate change is the increase of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. CO2 is the earth's number 1 greenhouse gas and can be released through the process of burning coal for energy. Coal mines around Mudgee, our local area, are collecting immense amounts of coal, and Australia produces 554 763 963 tons of coal per year.

To decrease the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere we have thought of a way to trap the carbon dioxide before it mixes in with our air.

If a filter is placed within a factory that burns coal, it will separate the carbon dioxide from the other gases before it gets released into the atmosphere. We will then combine the carbon from the carbon dioxide with organic waste. This mixture will then be compressed and heated with other chemicals and be pumped back into the earth.

By following these steps we are not only decreasing the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere but also restoring carbon into the Earth to create more coal. We have created a renewable cycle that will improve the quality of the atmosphere and restore the necessary minerals in the soil to survive."

Date: 12 and 19 November **Time:** 10.00am to 12 noon Follow the steps below:

- Pay any school subject fees that remain outstanding at the front office. The sign-out cannot be completed if contributions remain unpaid. Student Assistance is available where students have difficulty meeting their financial obligations. Please apply prior to this date.
- Collect a personalised, pre-printed leaver's form from the front office.
- Return all textbooks, library books and other school property to faculties. Some textbooks
 and resources may have already been returned and the partially completed leavers form
 will be held by the office.

HSC assessment ranks can be obtained by visiting the Students Online page of the NSW Education Standards (NESA) site www.educationstandards.nsw.edu.au from 2 December. **You will need to use your student number and the PIN number issued to you in a letter sent from NESA**. If you have any questions about your rankings or if you believe any are incorrect, an appeal must be lodged with Mr Rosolen by **9 November**.


