## Principal's message

#### The fair go part II

This week, a Deputy Secretary within the Department of Education reminded all the department's employees that, "In the lead-up to the election in March 2023, school staff – as department employees – must remain politically impartial in the course of their work." The subclause relating to the coming election was probably unneeded as all DoE employees must complete training annually in the department's Code of Conduct. The Code specifically states:

Employees have a right to participate in political and community activities and to pursue personal interests provided they do so in a private capacity and do not allow a conflict of interest to arise with their role in the department.

The highlighting is mine and goes to the heart of the matter. It is not the role of school staff to proselytise the merits of particular belief systems or political parties. The only conversions in a teacher's remit are the converting of non-readers into fluent readers, maths avoiders into maths adherents, science strugglers into science supporters and so forth.

The week before the Deputy Secretary's missive went out, a former NSW Director General of Education, Doctor Ken Boston, wrote an opinion piece for *The Sydney Morning Herald* titled: "Cranbrook's pool was no good for water polo, so the taxpayer helped fund a new one."

In case you missed it, here's the précis. There is at present a "building bonanza" (Doctor Boston's words) occurring in the private school\* network. In NSW alone, private schools will spend \$1.5 billion on capital works in the next five years. The reason Cranbrook received a special mention from Doctor Boston is that it will spend \$125m on upgrades that will include the replacement of the school's existing pool. The Cranbrook school council president – the equivalent of Mudgee High's P&C president – was quoted as saying that the current pool is, "... not very good for water polo" hence the need.

It should be stated that Doctor Boston was not bothered by the existence of private schools nor the extravagant outlays they made on lavish facilities. Doctor Boston made clear that he understood that the monies received from both the Feds and the State cannot be spent on niceties like covered, heated pools or baroque chapels. He was clear-cut in acknowledging the fact that public monies received by private

schools can only be used to cover the recurrent cost of teachers' salaries. It is at this point that I should explain that Teachers' salaries account for close to 85% of all spending in any given public school. To provide a similar service in a private school, it would not be a stretch to suggest that it would cost a similar amount to provide an equivalent service in a private setting.

Dr Boston's chief concerns were these. Taking teacher salaries out of the financial mix that is a private school's lot allows those same schools to provide some truly extraordinary building works that no public school will ever see. Worse, he lamented that in all states and territories, save for the NT, private schools, "receive, on average, more than 100 per cent of the schooling resource standard" while in all states and territories save for the ACT, "public schools are below 90 per cent" adding that current funding agreements, "allow state governments to continue to under-fund public schools so that, at best, they will achieve only 91 per cent of the standard by 2029." He called this situation a "national disgrace."

He called it a disgrace not just because this is a fundamental failure of equity; of social justice. Dr Boston's concern was that it is "fundamentally about building and maintaining our national stock of human capital. Australia will not reap the educational and economic dividends it seeks unless every young person, regardless of circumstances, is given the opportunity to reach his or her full potential."

We should all learn to recognise our triggers. In the following days, many private school apologists were triggered. They were quick to argue that every child deserves equal educational funding, regardless of wealth, a notion that flies well in the face of equity; something that is well at odds with the 'fair go.' If the government provided a bus but an individual demanded to use a private car, would it be reasonable to argue that the government should subsidise the purchase of that private car? If the local council provided a town pool but an individual wanted a private pool in their backyard, would a demand for a subsidy to build that pool pass the pub test?

Mudgee High is an open school, meaning that our external basketball and netball courts, as well as our playing field, are open to the public at weekends and through the school holidays. At weekends, will Cranbrook's pool be available to the public who helped provide it?

Apologies in advance if you feel there has been a little proselytising – a smidge of agitating – in this week's editorial. I think I know most of my triggers. As a 34-year veteran of the public school system who also attended public schools for his own education, the connected issues of equity and challenging expected entitlement have long been triggers for me... and I feel better for sharing.

#### Another reminder of changed term dates for the end of year

The last day for students is Friday 16 December. School staff will attend on both the following Monday and Tuesday to complete mandatory training in responding to anaphylaxis and carrying out cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

\* "Private school" is a bit of a misnomer. "Private schools" receive a significant amount of money from the Federal and the State governments. They also charge fees. In some cases, as noted above, those fees are extraordinarily close to the national minimum wage... for a single year's tuition. As a result, it would be more accurate to describe "private schools" as **public exclusive schools**. They are substantially publicly funded yet charge enough to keep out a significant proportion of that same public, making them frightfully exclusive.



### **ASX Sharemarket Game 1**

Twenty-eight Mudgee High students registered to participate in Round 1 of the ASX Sharemarket Game. This game allows students to learn about investing and the share market. Students receive a virtual \$50,000 which they can invest over a 10 week period, in over 200 companies listed on the Australian Securities Exchange. The prices students buy and sell at are the same prices as they would get in the live market, so this is as close to real life share trading as you can get.

Trading for this round started on Thursday 11 March and has now closed for the semester.
