Principal's message

Choice

On Thursday evening, beginning at 6 pm in the Performance Centre, we will host an information session for the parents and carers of Year 7 students. The focus of the information session will be choice.

It is just seven weeks since winter solstice passed, just six weeks since we moved into the second half of the year. Despite the feeling that the New Year is still an age away, planning for 2023 is well under way. It has to be in a complex operation like a secondary school; one that must cater for the needs of 800 young individuals.

Thursday's information session will focus on the move to electives in Year 8. Year 7 is a transition year. Students in Year 7 are no longer taught by largely one teacher each year as occurs in primary school. In high school they can have nine or more teachers and be required to change classrooms no fewer than five times a day. The crossover is that they have no choice over the classes they attend.

That changes in Year 8.

In Year 8, and in addition to all the regular subjects like English, Mathematics and Science, each student will undertake two elective classes per semester. In the second semester, they will undertake two new electives. By the end of Year 8, each student will have sampled four electives and be in a much better position to make informed choices about the electives they undertake in Years 9 and 10.

If you are the parent of a student in Year 7, you should consider attending the session on Thursday evening, especially if this is your first time with a Year 7 student in the family home. The information session should not go for more than an hour and that hour will include time for questions.

For our students, choosing electives for 2023 is so much better than not choosing electives – not engaging with the process – because courses will still operate, but others will have determined what will run.

COVID

Variously we hear statements like, "COVID is over" or worse, "the community has COVID fatigue" as though looking after oneself is a huge chore best ignored.

The collective response to COVID has certainly changed over the last

12 months, probably the result of increased vaccinations and booster rates, or at least improvements to access to such preventative measures. Based on what we see daily at school, however, COVID is very much **not** over in the Mudgee community. These past five days alone we have had students test positive in our support unit and in Years 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12. There are also two teachers isolating at the moment, the result of COVID infection.

At school, we continue to supply hand sanitiser in classroom settings, masks to those who request them and Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) kits through the front office. If you or your children have any symptoms, you are encouraged to make use of a RAT kit. Students who are unwell for whatever reason should remain at home until well.

COVID promises to be around for some time yet and the long-term effects of infection are still being determined. Given the circumstances in which we find ourselves, taking personal steps to avoid it would seem a sensible response.

Library News

What would be considered critical life skills? The skills for surviving in the wild would obviously be things like the ability to hunt, find water and build shelter. The topic of what this skills list would look like has probably been debated by nearly everyone at some point.

In relation to today's modern society, the list may include, among other things, the need to obtain money to feed, clothe and provide shelter for oneself in some form. It might be phrased differently, and the list might include other essential needs and wants of the individual being asked. Regardless, it is an interesting question.

One critical life skill that is probably not considered but underpins much of what we comprehend and experience in life, that can impact on the quality of life we live and indeed the ability to survive in the world, is the ability to read.

Cooking instructions to prepare food, directions to give children medicine, understanding processes to apply for work, applying for financial incentives/benefits, securing a family home, paying bills, ordering a takeaway meal... The list that makes reading an essential is endless.

There is scarcely a task in life to 'survive' in Australian society that does not necessitate some degree of reading. Yes, people for centuries survived without the ability to read, some still do in many countries. Generally, this is a tough existence.

Reading has been phrased by educators as 'a skill for life' for many years. Never has this been more relevant and should be considered in literal terms today.

Reading is a gift teachers and parents give children to survive, and the lessons can be simple, unstructured ones. Reading a book is what we first think of but reading anything works to develop reading skills. Following instructions on a packet cake, unboxing and building toys, asking a child to read headlines from the television, reading street signs... Everyday incidentals foster reading skills and for children obsessed with social media and devices this can be an easier row to hoe than trying to develop the old gold standard of a love of reading for life. Mind you, social media, websites and news feeds online can all yield legitimate reading experiences for people.

An odd message from an institution in the game of loaning books? Not at all. We know there are some students who will never read a book, especially through choice. It is a message to not give up, keep finding ways to encourage children to read, no matter how small the task (We will not mention 'the war' that was home learning during COVID lockdowns for some parents). The reward can have a profound impact, not only on learning but also on post school opportunities and life outcomes in general.

Let's keep fighting the good fight!



Commerce 01 Market Day

Students studying Commerce 01 spent Term 2 learning about the topic *Running Your Own Business*. This topic covered entrepreneurship, business structures, marketing, finance and operations within a business.

As a culminating activity, students created their own small business. This involved creating a product and designing marketing posters. Year 6 from Mudgee Public School came across to the Performance Centre to be the customers for the Commerce market stalls. Each Year 6 student was given \$20 of Monopoly money to spend at the stalls.

There was a cupcake and cookie stall, a mixed lollies stall and a stall which sold lava lamps and lollies. There were also a couple of game stalls. One game required the customer to bounce a ping pong ball on the table to hopefully have it land in the cup with the most chocolates. If this occurred, they won the cup of chocolates. Another game stall was a 'hang-man' game. Customers could suspend themselves by their hands on a purpose built set of stands. The player who could hang the longest was the winner and earned a prize.

All stalls were well on the day and had a good customer base.

In the end, the lava lamp and lollies stall finished trading with the highest rate of return on investment.

The Aboriginal Flag was raised inside the gym, followed by an Acknowledgement of Country. Lachlan Philpott delivered a presentation to the school about NAIDOC and this year's theme, "Get Up, Stand Up, Show Up."

During Periods 5 and 6, a bus full of excited students travelled out to Munna Reserve for a walking visit. They looked at various kind of bush tucker and resources growing on the Reserve. Students learnt about different stone tools and spears, as well as the significance of possum furs for making cloaks. Students discovered that from infancy, a person's possum fur cloak will be made and enlarged as the person grows into adulthood.

Upon return to school at lunch, the whole school was treated to a special BBQ. Students could choose from three sausages kinds of sausage; emu, kangaroo and crocodile. They also enjoyed a piece of wattle seed damper.

During Periods 7 and 8, students could choose to join in the art workshop where they painted themes onto wooden animal cut-outs. These will be displayed on the wall around the Aboriginal noticeboard.

A big thank you to all students and teachers who were involved in this year's NAIDOC Day celebrations, and to our local AECG representative, Aleshia Lonsdale, for her engaging presentation at Munna Reserve.
