Mobile phones

NSW Labor announced on Monday that if the party wins the state election in March, it will ban mobile phones in all school settings.

The leader of the NSW Labor party, Chris Minns, announced the proposed policy on Monday 5 September. His argument is a simple one: using phones at school "hurts our kids".

Since 1 January 2020, primary school students have been banned from having mobile phones at school in NSW. The NSW Department of Education's policy provides secondary schools with a little wriggle room in this space, where the same policy states that such schools, "retain discretion to opt into the restriction or implement an approach that best suits their circumstances and the needs of their diverse communities."

The matter of mobile phones and their relative merits and disadvantages was very much a point of discussion at Mudgee High around 2018-2019. At that time, examination of the issues related to unregulated use leaned heavily towards the disadvantages against any possible advantages.

Not much has changed in the intervening three years.

The good news is that mobile phone addiction has still not been listed as a thing in the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders*,

still in its 5th Edition.

The bad news, however, is that researchers in this field have continued to successfully demonstrate comparisons between excessive mobile phone usage and gambling addiction. It should come as no surprise that gambling is most certainly listed in the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, 5th Edition*.

The facts are these: at least four of the following signs and symptoms comprise criteria that points to mobile phone... dependence... compulsion... craving... obsession. It is possible to avoid calling it an addiction, but only just. It is that or at the very least problematic overuse, again because it is not yet listed in the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders*.

Each of these signs or symptoms has the potential to cause significant harm to the individual. They are:

- A need to use the mobile phone more and more often in order to achieve the same desired effect.
- Persistent failed attempts to decrease mobile phone usage.
- A preoccupation with smartphone use.
- Turning to one's mobile phone when experiencing unwanted feelings such as anxiety or depression.
- Excessive use characterised by loss of sense of time.
- Has put a relationship or job at risk due to excessive mobile phone use.
- An absence of acceptance.
- Need for newest mobile phone, more applications, or increased use.
- Withdrawal, when mobile phone or network is unreachable.
- Anger.
- Tension.
- Depression.
- Irritability.
- Restlessness..

By now you have probably noted there are more than four potential signs or symptoms. Six and a half hours break from these insidious little things is no big deal in the grand scheme, yet it does test a few of our students – for some or all of the reasons listed above.

Little wonder we moved to banning the use of mobile phones at school.

School-based apprenticeships and traineeships (SBATs)

Mudgee High School is currently seeking expressions of interest from Year 10 students considering the completion of a School-based apprenticeship or traineeship in 2023-24.

What are school-based apprenticeships and traineeships (SBATs) and how do they work?

SBATs are a great way for you to get a head start on your career while still at school. SBATs are available to all Year 10, 11 and 12 high school students in NSW.

By choosing to do an SBAT, you can gain a nationally recognised qualification as part of your Higher School Certificate (HSC). This is achieved by combining part-time work with formal training at school, TAFE NSW or another Registered Training Organisation (RTO). There are a range of industry opportunities available, with over 200 SBAT qualifications to choose from!

What will I get out of an SBAT?

A school-based apprentice will:

- Complete stage one of an apprenticeship part-time while completing the HSC.
- Work a minimum of 100 - 180 days* in paid employment by 31 December of the HSC year.
- Participate in formal training with TAFE NSW or another Registered Training Organisation.

A school-based trainee will:

- Complete a certificate II or III qualification while completing the HSC.
- Work a minimum of 100 - 180 days* in paid employment by 31 December of the HSC year.
- Participate in formal training with TAFE NSW or another Registered Training Organisation.

* as outlined in the relevant Vocational Training Order

Can I complete an SBAT and get an ATAR?

Yes, it is possible to complete a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship AND receive an ATAR. Talk to your careers adviser about your pattern of study and how an SBAT will fit into your HSC.

How often will I go to work?

Generally, one day per week during school terms as well as additional days during the school holidays. The days and times will be negotiated between you, your school and employer.

Will I be paid for the days I work?

Absolutely! As a school based apprentice or trainee you must be paid according to the wage rates and conditions of employment in the appropriate award or industrial agreement.

How do I get started?

It's simple:

- Decide on the occupation that interests you.
- Discuss with your careers adviser and parents/carers about how this will work with your HSC.

- Use your networks to gain employment – start with family, friends, local employers and explore job search websites.

If you already have a casual job, ask your employer if they would like more information about employing you as a school-based apprentice or trainee.

What happens after the HSC?

A school-based apprentice will enter stage two of their trade qualification and continue in employment as a full-time or part-time apprentice. A school-based trainee will be fully qualified and can begin working full-time, continue on to higher Vocational Education and Training or commence university.

Things to consider

Students who take on a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship are motivated young people who don't just want to plan their future career, they want to experience it now. It's very important that you think about how you can manage your SBAT by considering:

- Is this a career in which I'm interested?
- Can I balance school, work and training along with family and community commitments?
- Do I have a support network around me to help along the way? Teachers, Careers Adviser, parents/carers, friends, mentors, etc..
- Can I make travel arrangements to get myself to work and training on time?

If you answered YES to the questions above, an SBAT may be a great option for you.

Link news

This week, we would like to thank Midstate Smash Repairs for their ongoing support of the Link program. Midstate have taken on Mathew McGrath and here is what their Business Manager, Dan McGrath, had to say about Mathew and what they have to offer students in a work experience placement.

I want to start by sharing a little of who we are and what we do to better assist in explaining what Mathew has been participating in throughout his placement.

As you know, we have provided the opportunity and have been more than happy to accommodate many students over the years. On a couple occasions we have been fortunate enough to offer students an apprenticeship, some of whom are still employed with us today.

Most know and refer to us as the 'panel beater or smash repairer', being the umbrella term that describes the restoration of the body of a vehicle that has sustained damage from a collision or crash.

We are a local and small business that has been operating for well over 20 years. Here at Midstate Smash Repairs, we specialise in assisting locals with repairs and paint work on automotive vehicles, bikes and more. We work with local customers wanting private and or custom work done as well as those that need repairs organised by their insurance companies.

There are several areas and stages contributing to the production of what we do. Our workshop requires a minimum of two specialised trades, Panel Beating and Spray Painting. Each one of our tradespersons have had to take part in a 4-year apprenticeship to achieve their trade qualification and licence. During their apprenticeship, they are provided hands-on training from highly skilled inhouse tradespersons and additional training and resources from a training provider such as TAFE NSW and the Australian Apprenticeship Support Network.

Some of the many tasks that we undertake daily, and Mathew has had the privilege of being involved in, are:

- Consulting with clients, providing quotations and assisting with insurance related damages and repairs, custom projects and restorations.
- Washing down vehicles in preparation of proposed works.
- Dismantling vehicles for repairs, replacing parts and for painting.
- Panel beating and fixing items that can be reused or rejuvenated.
- Preparation of parts and panels requiring paint/refinish.
- Mixing and matching colour required to be applied to new, reused or rejuvenated parts and panels.
- Spray painting and refinishing parts and panels.
- Re-assembling vehicles and checking the operation of refitted parts.
- Quality control, check, de-nib and buff blemishes or impurities of refinished items.

- Finally, most importantly, wash, detail and prepare the finished product ready for collection.

Mathew has been a great help during his placement and has shown a genuine interest in what we do. He is currently working on a personal project of his own, a bumper bar off a car that he is doing up for when he gets his driver's licence. It was a project he was really excited to approach us about. It has given him the opportunity to be hands-on and it has allowed him the chance to complete something from start to finish, something that is not always possible as work placement is only one day a week.

We are extremely proud of Mathew and the effort he puts in every week. We are excited to continue working with him and seeing him finish his project. We hope that he continues his love for what we do here and look forward to the possibilities that could be available to him should he find himself wanting to work in this kind of industry.
