Principal's message

Resilience

The capacity to endure or to recover quickly from things we find difficult – the capacity to tough out the tough times – has a name. It is called resilience.

Resilience comes in various hues but I would wager there are three primary variants or colours to the resilience spectrum: low resilience, medium resilience and high resilience.

Those who struggle to attempt or persist with just about any challenge that comes their way have low resilience.

Those who can endure the adversities that come their way doing the things they like – the endurance rider who can spend a week in the saddle covering hundreds of kilometres in everything the weather throws at them yet scream blue murder when asked to wash the dishes – possess a kind of middle-of-the-road resilience.

Those who have made resilience a habit – who will apply themselves equally in hard times and good, to things they like doing and the things they would rather avoid – possess high resilience.

We each have our strengths and we each have our limitations. There are demands made of each of us in our daily lives that we find easily achieved and others that we find tough.

I like reading... to a point.

I am in awe of people who can finish a novel over a weekend. I know I do not have the stamina for it. I like my reading in instalments. The train trip from Lithgow to Sydney is just about my reading limit.

And I was an English teacher.

The awe I feel for those who can plough through several hundred pages in a few short days is simply that: awe. It should not be confused with admiration as the thing achieved by the avid bookworm has required little resilience on their part.

What the bookworm has achieved has been a labour of love.

I am an active photographer of railways. I have been an active photographer of railways since I was 12. I can wait lineside for hours on end. Wait out the arrival of some rare movement. Wait out the perfect light conditions.

Occasionally, Mrs Eade has found herself unavoidably at my side during one of these lineside vigils. It would be fair to say that she does not have my patience in these circumstances. Any resilience she may have is always overwhelmed by an abiding sense of pointlessness. And that's fine. Even I can recognise the pointlessness of the activity.

But it doesn't stop me.

Mrs Eade occasionally endures what I call "training missions". I endure time spent in the city while she explores the perfumeries looking for a particular scent. The good news is that we both recover quickly from these minor adversities; these tests of our respective levels of resilience.

A lot of notes cross my desk daily, explaining student absenteeism. The great majority are quite reasonable: illnesses, medical appointments, family bereavements and the like.

Some, however, demonstrate an absence of resilience and a sense of capitulation.

"She doesn't like school."

"He didn't want to go."

"She doesn't like basket weaving*."

Seriously?

I have always been impressed by students prepared to step out of their respective comfort zones and attempt something when the prospect of success is next to zero. Impressive is the student who dons their sports uniform, turns up to the cross country and gives it a crack, even when they know that there next to no chance they will finish anywhere close to first.

Less impressive is the student who turns up the next day with a note seeking to explain their lack of resilience as a one-day, almost-certainly-fictional ailment.

It makes me think of a now old episode of *The Simpsons* in which Homer celebrates his son's lack of resilience, perhaps because it mirrors his:

Homer: "Hey, how come you never play your guitar anymore?"

Bart: "I'll tell you the truth dad. I wasn't good at it right away, so I quit. (pause) I hope you're not mad."

Homer: "Son, come here, (he laughs as Bart sits on his knee). Of course I'm not mad. (Sagely) If something is hard to do then it's not worth doing. You just stick that guitar in the closet with your shortwave radio, your karate outfit and your unicycle and we'll go inside and watch TV."

Bart: "What's on?"

Homer: "It doesn't matter."

Fostering resilience in young people isn't about celebrating their achievements when they do tough things they love doing. Fostering resilience in the young people with whom we are daily connected is about having expectations that they will attempt the things expected of them to the best of their ability – give the demands life throws at them their personal best – whether they enjoy those things or not, but especially when they are things they don't like doing.

Commerce 02 – Crime – Forensic Investigation

As part of their studies for the Crime topic in Term 4, the Commerce 02 class has been conducting a forensic investigation of a murder. The investigation includes a seven step investigative process whereby pieces of evidence are presented to the groups incrementally. As they complete each step, they are issued with the next package of evidence. Step 5 required the students to conduct some practical activities including chromatography to compare the inks in the pen used to write the note left at the murder scene, comparing fibre samples from the clothing of the suspects with the fibre left at the crime scene, and finally comparing hair samples from the suspects with the hair sample found at the crime scene.

After several lessons of investigation and research, students solved the crime and were able to arrest the murderer. The next step is for students to conduct a court trial....more to come.



Science news

Science provides us with the tools to see the world from a data driven perspective. With the festive season around the corner, it would be fitting to break down the some of the statistics and science behind Christmas.

Santa's sleigh would have to travel 1040 kilometres per hour to deliver all the presents. That would be close to the speed of sound!

If Santa ate a biscuit in all the homes he visited, he would consume close to 3 billion calories.

No matter how well you package those Christmas lights, the second law of thermodynamics dictates they will get tangled. Physicists have proven that any cord longer than 2 metres will infuriate even the most fastidious packer.

Even if reindeer can't fly, they can float! Their top layer of fur consists of longer, tubular hair which provides insulation and makes them very buoyant.

Reindeer have 25% more blood vessels in their nose than humans. This helps keep their noses warm and can give them a light rosy colour.

Change of school uniform commencing in 2024

Mudgee High School's uniform was reviewed in conjunction with the school's Parents & Citizens committee in 2023.

As per Department of Education Policy, a transition period to implement the new uniform changes will be in place for the next two years (2024 and 2025).

This means items of uniform that students currently have can continue to be worn for the rest of their useful life.

The review sought to update, in conjunction with our suppliers, uniform items that can be reliably and consistently stocked, with the addition of a number of new items of winter uniform being added.

The only change to the existing uniform that will commence in 2024, is the introduction of the navy and red polo shirt for the junior school (Years 7-10). The rest of the existing uniform will remain the same.

Our two local uniform suppliers, *Mudgee Embroidery and Uniforms* and *Brand Me Mudgee*, are in the process of obtaining stock of these shirts, should families wish to start transitioning to the new uniform for the start of 2024.

2024 School Bus Passes

Information for Parents and Carers

Is your child eligible for free bus travel to and from school?

All bus passes will be distributed to eligible students via mail early next year so if your child is enrolled in a local school, please note the following:

- Students going into Kindergarten, Year 3 and Year 7 must apply for a new pass.
- If you have moved address or schools you must 'update existing details'.
- If you are unsure whether or not your child has a current bus pass, please contact our office on 6372 2489.
- To travel on our bus service, students MUST present their bus pass to the driver morning and afternoon. If they are ineligible or do not have a pass, they can pay a fare.
