# Principal's message

## Parent Teacher Evening

Readers of this newsletter can rest assured that students arriving on late buses have NOT been marked as being late to school.

That said, at the core of these reports there was a truth. That truth was given substance by some historical research and some active surveillance.

The school's technical support officer – the TSO, our computer person – was tasked with revisiting two weeks of the vision provided by our playing field security cameras to determine how many buses were arriving at or after 08:55. Additionally, Head Teachers on morning bus duty were tasked with quizzing students coming off those buses which ones they had ridden. I was looking for a pattern of regular offenders. The TSO continued her surveillance over the same period.

With four weeks of CCTV evidence and more than two weeks of Head Teacher observations, the findings were in.

In the period of observation, 66 buses arrived after 08:55. 29 buses arrived at or after 09:00 (first bell). Two buses arrived after 09:10. The services with the least enviable record were; Piambong; Yarrabin; Ulan; Wollar; Cooks Gap; and, Wilbertree.

Armed with this information, a very positive conversation was had with Ogden's Mudgee manager. It was obvious that he shared the school's concerns. On Friday morning, the manager made a surprise visit to our bus bay to see the situation for himself.

In the pages that follow, you will see that several bus schedules and routes will change effective the first day of Term 2. These changes should better accommodate our students' needs. Although many of our students will still be obliged to take a street tour of the St Matthew's site on Bruce Road, as that school begins its day at 08:50, they should be at MHS with time to spare.

### Showcase

A last reminder that on Wednesday 29 March, the school will be open from 4pm until 6pm, showcasing much of what it has to offer high school aged citizens of Mudgee and its environs. The adults in this great community of ours should consider coming along so as to discover just how much school has changed since their days at school.

# Term 2 2023 School Bus Service Changes

# From Monday 24 April 2023 there will be minor changes to some School Bus Services in the Mudgee area. Services not listed below will not change.

## **Piambong Bus**

The Piambong bus will no longer service Saleyards Ln in the morning or afternoon and operate direct via the Castlereagh Hwy. It will also commence and operate past all stops 2 mins earlier in the mornings.

In the afternoons, the Piambong bus will no longer stop at Mudgee Preschool Perry St or the PCYC on Market St. It will drop on Mortimer St (2 stops), St Mary's Catholic Church and Robertson Park, Market St.



## <u>Yarrabin Bus</u>

The Yarrabin bus will commence and operate past all stops 10 mins earlier in the mornings. It will also service Saleyards Ln, passing the intersection of Castlereagh Hwy and Saleyards Ln at 08:24 (6 mins earlier than current). Drop off times in the afternoon will be similar to current.

## **Ulan and Cooks Gap Buses**

The Ulan and Cooks Gap buses will operate past all stops between Cooks Gap Fire Shed and Mudgee town 5 mins earlier than current in the mornings.

# NAIDOC 2023 'For our Elders'

Students are permitted to wear NAIDOC themed shirts on the school's NAIDOC Day - Wednesday 28 June.

# School vaccination program



School vaccination program (Mudgee High School vaccination clinic date to be confirmed).

Keeping your child up to date with routine vaccinations helps to protect them from serious preventable diseases such as meningococcal, whooping cough, tetanus, and cancers that are caused by HPV (human papillomavirus).

As part of the NSW School vaccination program, students in Year 7 are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Parental consent is required for your child to receive routine vaccinations at school. If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide this consent online (see below).

From February 2023, children in Year 7 will now only need one dose of HPV vaccination. This change has been endorsed by the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) based on evidence showing that one dose provides the same level of protection against HPV as two doses.

If you have already consented to your child receiving two doses of HPV vaccine, they will only receive one dose.

If your child previously missed their second dose of HPV vaccine, they are now considered fully vaccinated and do not require a second dose.

A small number of students who are immunocompromised are still recommended to receive a three-dose course of HPV vaccine. If your child is immunocompromised, it is important to discuss their immunisation needs with their GP.

If your child misses a school vaccination clinic, you can speak to a GP or pharmacist about catching up on vaccination.

## ONLINE CONSENT FORMS FOR THE SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide online consent for their routine school vaccinations.

In Year 7, students are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received.

#### How to provide consent:

To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit:

#### https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school

Follow the steps to log in to your existing Service NSW account. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a <u>Service NSW</u> account, refer to Service NSW to create one.

Update or confirm your personal details in Service NSW as required.

Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child/ren. You will need to:

- a. Enter your child's personal details.
- b. Provide the Medicare card details for you and your child.
- c. Read the linked Parent Information Sheet and privacy statement
- d. Provide consent.

If you or your child do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form directly from your child's school.

#### The benefits of providing consent online:

- easily update your child's details
- receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).

**What is the format?** This is a 14-hour course which is usually delivered as a 2-day training package (7 hours per day).

# Now is the time to claim ABSTUDY for your high school child



ABSTUDY is a group of payments for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians. ABSTUDY helps with the costs of studying or doing an Australian Apprenticeship.

It can help with your child's school fees, boarding costs, travel to and from school and other school items. If your child's travel is impacted by COVID-19 or they need to study remotely, ABSTUDY can also help.

If you're a parent or guardian and your child is younger than 16, you should claim on their behalf. If your child is 16 and over, or independent, they can claim themselves. To claim, call the Services Australia's ABSTUDY line on Freecall 1800 132 317.

If they're starting university or TAFE, they'll be able to claim online through myGov.

Claiming before 1 December means ABSTUDY payments can be finalised in time for the start of school next year. This is very important if your child needs to move away from home to study.


