



School vaccination clinics

The school vaccination clinics for Years 7 and 10 have been rescheduled for **29 and 30 May** due to the low uptake of online registration. We urge parents to take up this opportunity for free vaccination. Instructions on how to register your child are provided below.

Keeping your child up to date with routine vaccinations helps to protect them from serious preventable diseases such as meningococcal, whooping cough, tetanus, and cancers that are caused by HPV (human papillomavirus).

As part of the NSW School vaccination program, students in Year 7 are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Parental consent is required for your child to receive routine vaccinations at school. If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide this consent online (see below).

From February 2023, children in Year 7 will now only need one dose of HPV vaccination. This change has been endorsed by the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) based on evidence showing that one dose provides the same level of protection against HPV as two doses.

If you have already consented to your child receiving two doses of HPV vaccine, they will only receive one dose.

If your child previously missed their second dose of

HPV vaccine, they are now considered fully vaccinated and do not require a second dose.


A small number of students who are immunocompromised are still recommended to receive a three-dose course of HPV vaccine. If your child is immunocompromised, it is important to discuss their immunisation needs with their GP.

If your child misses a school vaccination clinic, you can speak to a GP or pharmacist about catching up on vaccination.

ONLINE CONSENT FORMS FOR THE SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide online consent for their routine school vaccinations.



In Year 7, students are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received.

How to provide consent:

To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit:

https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school

Follow the steps to log in to your existing Service NSW account. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a <u>Service NSW</u> account, refer to Service NSW to create one.

Update or confirm your personal details in Service NSW as required.

Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child/ren. You will need to:

- a. Enter your child's personal details.
- b. Provide the Medicare card details for you and your child.
- c. Read the linked Parent Information Sheet and privacy statement
- d. Provide consent.

If you or your child do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form directly from your child's school.

The benefits of providing consent online:

- easily update your child's details
- receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).

Athletics Carnival

Our annual athletics carnival will be held on Friday 26 May (Week 5) at Walkers Oval. The carnival is considered a normal school day and attendance is required. Students will need to bring their ID card to swipe in before 9 am.

Events held on the day will include 100m, 200m, long jump, high jump, discus, shotput, javelin and various novelty events. The 400m will be held at 8:30 am, before the main carnival begins.

Mudgee High's carnival is all about participation, trying your best, having fun and getting involved in the House spirit. Students are encouraged to participate in all events and to dress in House colours.

A small canteen will operate on the day and Year 12 will run a barbecue and food stall as part of their fundraising efforts for Mudgee Hospital. Bus companies will be diverted to Walkers Oval and students will need to be at the carnival by 8.55 am.

Some events will be held prior to the carnival and students will be informed of the dates in the daily messages during roll call over the coming weeks. These include the 800m, 1500m, 3000m and triple jump. Students will be required to nominate for these events. They can do so at the PDHPE staffroom.

It is very important that students listen to announcements during roll call and assembly, as this is our main mode of communication with students regarding sporting events.

Cross Country

The Cross Country will take place on Wednesday 31 May (Week 6). This event is compulsory for students in Years 7 to 10. It is not compulsory for our senior students, however, their participation is strongly encouraged. Students must participate in the school event to be eligible for Western Area trials selection.

The course will start and finish at Walkers Oval and run along the walking track to Lawson Park.

Students will walk under teacher supervision to Walkers Oval at the end of lunch and return to school in time for the end of school bell.

Students are asked to listen to the announcements in roll call and assembly in coming weeks for further information.



Nationally Consistent Collection of Data



Dear parents, guardians and carers.

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- · year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. Aerospace Camp - Mudgee

Sunday 18 June to Wednesday 21 June.

Over four days and three nights, students attending Aerospace Camp will experience activities that are immersive, interactive, fun and have an underlying emphasis on wellbeing and the development of employability skills including team building, creativity and problem solving.

The program includes:

- Astronomy and the Australian night sky
- Australia's contributions to space exploration
- Artemis Missions to the Moon and Mars
- Designing and building galactic habitats
- Designing, building, and launching a variety of Rockets
- Constructing, driving, and exploring a range of Rovers
- Problem solving challenges utilising Robotics
- Living and working sustainably on the Moon and Mars
- History of Space travel and exploration
- STEM Careers Expo

Each camp has 32 places for students aged 12 to 14. All participants will be fully accommodated at Mudgee Valley Park with all activities occurring at Club Mudgee over the four-day program.

Interested students must be aged 12 to 14 at the date of the camp and currently enrolled at a school within the Mid-Western Regional Shire. To apply, students will be required to:

- Upload a letter of recommendation from you, as principal of the school.
- Upload a supporting letter from their parents/guardians.
- Upload a two-minute video about themselves and why they should be selected.

Applications to participate will need to be submitted by 14 May. Successful participants will be selected using criteria such as regional school enrolment, level of support and level of interest from the student. Successful participants will be notified by 21 May.

The **Youth Mental Health First Aid** course will teach you how to assist adolescents who may be experiencing a mental health problem or mental health crisis until appropriate professional help is received or the crisis resolves, using a practical, evidence-based Action Plan.

The course is based on guidelines developed through the expert consensus of people who have experience with mental health problems and mental health professionals.

Mental health problems covered include:

Depression and anxiety • Eating disorders • Psychosis • Substance abuse problems.

Mental health crises covered include:

Suicidal thoughts and behaviours • Non-suicidal self-injury • Panic attacks • Traumatic events • Severe psychotic states • Severe effects from alcohol or other drug use • Aggressive behaviours.

Please note: This course is not a therapy or a support group.

Who can attend this course? Any adult can attend. The course is not appropriate for adolescents to attend.

What is the format? This is a 14-hour course which is usually delivered as a 2-day training package (7 hours per day).

Now is the time to claim ABSTUDY for your high school child



ABSTUDY is a group of payments for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians. ABSTUDY helps with the costs of studying or doing an Australian Apprenticeship.

It can help with your child's school fees, boarding costs, travel to and from school and other school items. If your child's travel is impacted by COVID-19 or they need to study remotely, ABSTUDY can also help.

If you're a parent or guardian and your child is younger than 16, you should claim on their behalf. If your child is 16 and over, or independent, they can claim themselves. To claim, call the Services Australia's ABSTUDY line on Freecall 1800 132 317.

If they're starting university or TAFE, they'll be able to claim online through myGov.

Claiming before 1 December means ABSTUDY payments can be finalised in time for the start of school next year. This is very important if your child needs to move away from home to study.
