Habits

This week on assembly, I shared with students a milestone I reached this year.

It is fifty years since I learned to ride a bicycle.

I was no stranger to two wheels. I had had a scooter for a number of years. That scooter even had pneumatic tyres! Learning to ride a bicycle is, as most of us know, something else again. Mine was a 27 inch job, what would now be a 69 cm bike, putting me well above the pavement. Learning to stay upright while peddling, and while remaining conscious of the potential dangers around me, was a big call and relied on a much practice.

Then, after sixteen years of cycling, the rules changed.

Now an adult in his twenties, I was expected to wear a helmet every time I went cycling. I can admit that more than once and well after leaving home, I was compelled to perform a quick U-turn and return. I returned home to collect my helmet.

After sixteen years of cycling, wearing a helmet would take some time to become habitual.

Similarly, when COVID kicked off and masks were mandated in all public places, more than once I found myself returning to the car to collect a mask before going to work or entering shops or using public transport.

Education

More recently, the need to habitualise a response has been made necessary by the move to ban the use of one-use plastic bags. Arriving at a supermarket checkout with a trolley full of stuff is no longer enough. You need to pe prepared to either buy bags or you bring your own.

Developing a new habit is tough. Developing a new habit is tough because it is really about ceasing an old habit.

Old habits are default habits.

The neural pathway – the pathway in our brains that allows us to do things without thinking – is already in place. It is in place because of practice. It is in place because of repetition. It is the default.

Well mapped neural pathways allow us to ride a bicycle or drive a car without consciously thinking about it. Well mapped neural pathways allow us to respond instinctively to changing conditions; like the sudden need to brake without having to remember where the brakes are located. Well mapped neural pathways are also the reason why reformed smokers occasionally struggle to resist the urge to smoke, sometimes years after they have quit.

Talking to our students last Wednesday, the message I wanted to convey in all of this was that when we can consciously recognise that some of those well mapped neural pathways are unhelpful, we are better placed to change them. When we recognise that some of our habits are bad habits, like firing up the moment things get hard or we are obliged to do things that take us out of our comfort zones, we are already on the way to changing.

Remapping neural pathways through practice is something each of has the capacity to do.

I know neural remapping is possible because I seriously feel naked on my bike if I am not wearing a helmet!

English news

The English faculty has had an eventful beginning of term. So many classes are working hard. At the bottom of this article is a list of our Google classrooms and an overview of the first assessment tasks that are due towards the end of Term 1 or, for Year 11s, part way through Term 2.

A reminder too that Years 7 and 9 are working on the new English Syllabus this year. We will incorporate Years 8 and 10 next year into the new units. As a result, some units may have changed or been adapted when compared to previous years.

Here are some of the things that we are running for our students:

- **Debating:** Two teams have been entered in the Year 7/8 Premier's Debating Challenge and two teams in the Year 9/10 Premier's Debating Challenge. We will need to keep in contact with our teams to see how they fare over the next couple of terms.
- **Reading Challenge:** There is a core group of students who are undertaking the Premier's Reading Challenge. We hope they are enjoying their book choices and beginning to steadily read until the end of August.
- **Writing:** There will be several competitions available for those who love writing. Students need to pay attention to the morning announcements for more details.
- **Book Week:** There will be competitions during Term 3 to celebrate Book Week. More details about these will be provided later in the year.

This edition's literacy tip: One way to help support our teenagers is by increasing their vocabulary. At school, Mr Eade provides everyone with a 'Word of the Day' to give the students and staff an overview of a word, what it means and how it came about. At home, students and parents can engage in crossword puzzles together or play games like Wordle, Scrabble, Boggle or Bananagrams. While playing these games, point out new, interesting or unfamiliar words. Discuss what they mean and how your child might apply this word to their life at home or at work.

Assignments may be submitted in either hand-written or typed form. If students wish to submit their work digitally, this should be done through Google Classroom's Submit function. This is the preference for digital submissions. However, work may be handed in on paper. Please do not assume that everything must be digital.

If your child is unable to meet the due date for an assessment task, they will need to complete an application for Special Consideration. These forms can be collected from the HSIE staffroom. It is the responsibility of the student to collect this form, complete it and return it to the Head Teacher of HSIE or their classroom teacher. In the event of a sudden absence, perhaps the result of illness or misadventure, the form can be completed after the due date. In all other circumstances, application for Special Consideration must be completed in advance of the due date.

The NSW Premier's Reading Challenge is now open and Mudgee High School is excited to be participating!

Monday 26 February 2024: Challenge opens

Friday 23 August 2024: Challenge closes for student entries

What is the NSW Premier's Reading Challenge?

The PRC is a statewide Challenge that encourages students to develop a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students and enables them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition, but a challenge to encourage each student to read, to read more, and to read more widely.

All students who complete the challenge, and have their reading record validated by the school's PRC coordinator, will receive a certificate signed by the Premier of NSW.

How many books do students need to read?

Students in Years 3 to 10 are challenged to read 20 books independently. At least 10 of these books must be from the relevant Challenge booklists, and up to 10 books can be personal choice books.

If a book is from an approved PRC series, students can enter up to 5 books as Challenge books, and can read up to 10 other books from the same series as Personal Choice books. More information on the rules of the Challenge can be found on the PRC website.

Books must be added to a student's online reading record by **Friday 23 August 2024** in order for their reading record to be validated and receive a certificate.

How do students log their reading?

Students can access the PRC's <u>Student Experience site</u> using their DoE username and password, or can log into the site via the Student Portal. A video guide explaining how to use the Student Experience site can be found here.

Students may also record their reading on the Personal Reading Log and submit it to the PRC Coordinator, Ms Tetley, by 23 August 2024. Ms Tetley will complete the reading log on the students' behalf.

How can students find books on the NSW PRC challenge lists?

Ms Tetley can provide students with a printout of the list so that they can do a search in the School's Library to locate any copies. All of the relevant book lists for this year's competition have been set up on Google classroom.

Midwestern Regional Council – Mudgee Library also has a system organised for easy identification of books on the list. They have a PRC sticker on them and are identified in their online catalogue.

Ms Tetley is the PRC Coordinator for Mudgee High School's entrants this year.

A quick guide for logging books:

- Log into the Student experience site using your DoE student username and password.
- Use the blue search bar to search for books you have read.



If the title appears, click "Add to Reading Log" to add it as a PRC book.




• If the title does not appear, you will need to enter it as a personal choice book.

To enter a personal choice book:

- Click on the icon in the top right-hand corner. Home Rules Log out
- Click on "My reading log".



• Fill in the book details under the "Add a Personal Choice book" field and click "add".

NSW Education Parent App

The NSW Education Parent App has several new features making it even easier for parents and carers to stay in touch with the latest news, access learning resources, and get emergency updates from their child's school.

The new-look app is designed to streamline communication between schools and parents and carers with features such as push notifications to your phone so you never miss any important news or an upcoming event. Users will also now be able to receive emergency updates such as school closures, and access learning and enrolment resources.
